

SOCIETY NOTES

Members of Neighborhood Club Hear Republican and Democratic Speakers at Meeting Yesterday

The policies of both major political parties were expounded yesterday by C. B. Eberhard, Republican, and Henry L. Hess, Democrat, at a meeting of the Neighborhood Club at 2 o'clock at the La Grande hotel. Mrs. Fred E. Kiddle arranged the meeting which created a great deal of interest among the members of the club. The speakers were introduced by Mrs. H. N. Ashby who led the audience in singing patriotic songs, accompanied by Mrs. George Birnie.

The case of the Republican party as outlined by Mr. Eberhard dealt with the tariff, including the protective tariff on agricultural products, and what has been done for labor in the past four years, using Hoover's speech at Des Moines, Iowa as a basis. Mr. Eberhard also is not an advocate of cancellation of the war debts.

"As long as the party is in existence we will have tariff," Mr. Eberhard believes.

In discussing labor, the speaker stated that big business began immediately to place wages, but Hoover has made a valiant attempt to stop it, and also to speed up construction and improvements. The American Federation of Labor also did its part in upholding wages, he said.

"In the condition in which the country is now, we should not change our leader," Mr. Eberhard stressed.

"Depression," according to the Democratic exponent, Henry L. Hess, "was not caused by war." The anti-trust laws have been absolutely ignored and the country has been flooded with worthless bonds, he said, adding the curb was taken off through the action of the last administration. In the last year the administration paid more on the national debt than has been paid since Wilson went out of office, the speaker said. The decrease of income tax also has robbed the treasury, Mr. Hess said in summing up several of the causes of the depression.

Hoover says that taxes on homes, farms and real property must be relieved, Mr. Hess added, and taxation must fall on the big man in proportion to the weight with which it falls on the small.

The present day is not a period when there is no wealth, but it is a period when the wealth is in the pockets of a few men, he believes. The foreign markets have been destroyed, he said, and because of the high tariff in the United States, Canada has taken American markets, and Canadian lumber mills are running to capacity while those in this country are closed.

H. E. Dixon, president of the Union County Health association, discussed the Christmas seal sale and urged the club to continue giving as it has done in the past. Mrs. N. W. Pres, of the Red Cross, asked for volunteers to assist in the annual roll call.

Turkey

Crop Has

13% Increase

The number of turkeys on farms on Oct. 1 this year was about 13 per cent. larger than at that date in 1931 and the 1932 turkey crop was one of the largest ever raised in this country according to the annual estimate of the department of agriculture. Increases were general in all regions and in nearly all states. Cold storage holdings of turkeys of Oct. 1 were smaller than a year earlier.

The increased numbers this year were due both to more farmers raising turkeys this year than last and to larger average number of turkeys per flock. The proportion of the regular crop reporters of the department who reported turkeys on their farms in September this year was 9 per cent. larger than the proportion who reported turkeys on their farm

in September last year. There was also a considerable increase this year in large scale or commercial production, especially in a number of the middle western states.

A further market increase in the operations of commercial hatcheries in the production of young poults for sale took place this year. Hatcheries that made comparable reports in 1932 and 1931 showed increases of 89 per cent in the number of turkey eggs set and 85 per cent in the number of poults hatched this year over last. Hatcheries in all sections of the country showed large increases, but still only a small percentage of the total number hatched.

While conditions during the spring months were generally unfavorable for farm hatching, early losses were above average the summer and fall were very favorable for raising the young turkeys and reports indicate that the condition of the birds about Oct. 1 was as good or better, than on
