

School Census At Enterprise Shows 505 Count

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special)—The school census just completed for district 21, which comprises the city of Enterprise and some additional territory, all in Walla Walla county, revealed that there were 505 children between the ages of four and 20 in the district who will draw school money. Of the 505, 202 were males and 303 females. A reversal of the figures for 1931, which showed a total of 513 with 253 boys and 260 girls. The census was taken by Routh P. Fowler for George M. Gally, district clerk.

AL SPEAKS FOR ROOSEVELT AND GARNER IN TROY

"Now I never had any doubt about the Democratic cause," Smith boomed. "and I never entertained for a moment a doubt about the success of the Democratic ticket, but if perchance some doubt did creep into my mind, it was thoroughly dispelled when I listened to President Hoover at Madison Square Garden."

"What hope is there," Smith asked, "of getting a president to acknowledge that he was in error? He is going to back up everything he did to the last ditch, no matter how wrong it may be, and what chance is there of changing his mind?"

"What chance is there of impressing on the Republican majority in the congress of the United States that for four years back they have been entirely in error; that they have retraced their steps; that they must take another turn and admit their own weakness?"

"There is no chance of doing that, and we know it will never be done. Therefore, the hope for the solution of all these problems lies in the election of Roosevelt and Garner and a Democratic congress."

Smith said he agreed with Mr. Hoover that "you cannot extend the mastery of government over the daily life of the people."

"And that is exactly what is the matter with the 18th amendment," he said.

He commented on the president's warnings about "the growth of bureaucracy such as we have never seen in our history."

"The greatest example of it is in the department of congress that he himself presided over since 1920," Smith said.

"Bureaucracy has grown up under the Republican administration until they have taken away from the states all the power that he was able to constitutionally take, and then some."

Elliott Claims Oregon Vote To Go For Hoover

PORTLAND, Nov. 3 (AP)—Thomas C. Elliott, chairman of the Republican state central committee yesterday issued a statement claiming Oregon for Hoover by a substantial majority.

The pivotal states were "improving." After the Maine election they did not conceal their conviction that strong medicine was needed if the Republican cause was to win out, and they changed their whole method of campaign to that end.

By common consent, therefore, the debate over the outcome would seem to have simmered down to just this: Have the Republicans been able, during the final weeks of the campaign, to reverse the forces which were operating against them during the preceding months?

Spectacular Campaign

It is not within the province of this writer to forecast the answer, but it can be said at least that the situation has produced a far more spectacular campaign finish than anyone foresaw.

No one will deny that the Republicans have tried. Instead of making three campaign speeches, as he had planned, President Hoover has delivered scores. Instead of disregarding his Democratic opponent as he did four years ago, he has indulged in direct quotation and answer. Win or lose, the Republican windup will remain in future years one of the memorable features of the campaign.

Whether all this effort would possibly have any decisive effect depends on who is right about the underlying conditions of this campaign.

Which Theory Is Right

If the Democratic theory is correct, and a preponderance of anti-Hoover sentiment became "frozen" long ago, then of course the final whirl of Republican activity has come too late.

If the Republican theory is correct, and those voters who hold the balance of power merely have been hesitating, the story may be different.

The reader can judge for himself—and then see on the night of Nov. 8 how nearly right he was.

Stimson Explains State Department Loan Activities

DAYTON, Ohio, Nov. 3 (AP)—Answering assertions which Senator Carter Glass of Virginia made Tuesday night in a radio speech about the policy of the state department in respect to foreign loans, Secretary of State Stimson yesterday issued the following statement:

"The state department has never recommended the merits of any foreign loans and it has constantly made it clear that it did not do so. What it has done has been to advise against any loan whatever being made by

our citizens to countries or for purposes where it was against the national interest of the United States government for a loan to be made.

"Thus after the war it advised against loans being made to countries which would not fund their war debt, to us, and largely by its action a number of countries were encouraged more promptly to settle and fund their floating indebtedness to us. This was a most valuable service to the United States.

"This practice of the state department was established by Chief Justice Hughes when he was secretary of state and at that time Mr. Hughes made a public statement to the effect that the state department would not pass upon the merits or approve the merits of any foreign loan."
