

Trojans, Stanford Picked to Win Saturday; Oregon Game Toss-Up

CALIFORNIA OUT TO UPSET TROY DESPITE RECORD

Washington State College to Meet the Light Vandal Team—U. C. L. A., Montana to Rest.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4 (AP)—As usual, the long-invincible Trojans of Southern California will be favorites when they face the University of California's Golden Bears in Olympic stadium at Los Angeles tomorrow in hopes of taking one more step toward another Pacific Coast conference football championship.

Although the odds ran as high as 2½ to 1 against them, the twice-defeated Bears have hopes of being the first to cross the Trojan goal line this season. California has appeared increasingly strong in recent games and Coach "Navy" Bill Ingram has concentrated on defense against the Trojan aerial attack, strongest point in the U. S. C. offensive.

Hopes of the Ingram men for an upset hang largely on the absence of Orr Mohler, star Trojan back, permanently lost to U. S. C. because of a back injury, and the promised first appearance of the veteran "Hard Luck Hank" Schalbach, California's captain, against Southern California. Twice put out of Southern California games by injuries, Schalbach won't be in exactly the best of condition, what with an injured ankle, a recent touch of the flu and loss of practice—but he's a big hope for the battered Bears.

In Palo Alto the twice-beaten Cardinals of Stanford will be slight favorites to win over the University of Washington Huskies, touted as Coach Jimmie Phelan's strongest squad. The Huskies come into the game after an easy previous weekend and with a revamped backfield and high hopes.

Three Bearcat Regulars Not To See Much Action

SALEM, Nov. 4 (AP)—A revamped lineup will perform for Willamette university against Linfield college here tonight with three of the Bearcat regulars out, cutting down any edge the Bearcats might have had. Pacific university should have little trouble beating Albany college in the only other Northwest conference game this week, and thereby placing itself as a Willamette menace for next week.

Walter Erickson will not be in the starting lineup for Willamette and may not play because of injuries. Dick Jockish, tackle, was declared ineligible by university officials here and Johnny Orave, sensational halfback, will be held out of the game pending definite word on his eligibility.

Keith Jones will play one halfback position and Cannady will take the other. Jack Connors will be started at tackle. This still leaves a good defensive team, but slows the offensive. However Olson and Cannady have constantly improved their ball carrying this week and may supply the necessary punch.

Voll and Heiser are the feared Linfield backs and McGowan is outstanding on the Wildcat line.

The rook starting lineup will be practically the same as started against the frosh in the first game at Corvallis. Bob Patrick, who is to call signals, may not be able to answer the opening whistle as he is still in a weakened condition from an attack of tonsillitis. Bill Jowdy will direct the team while he is out.
