Ackerman P. T. A. Meets at E.O.N.

There were 60 present at the meeting of the J. H. Ackerman Parent Teachers' association, held Thursday evening at the Normal school.

During a brief business meeting presided over by Mrs. Guy Miller, Mrs. George Richardson gave a report of the recent convention at Baker, at which there were four representatives from the Ackerman P. T. A.

Miss Kate Houk was leader of the program for the evening "Literature in the Home." The value of reading as a worthy use of leisure was emphasized because it is an aid in teaching ideals, impresses geographical and historical facts and develops character.

The Newbery prize books were briefly reviewed by a group of seventh grade children, who also enacted a little scene in the book store of Mr. Newbery, an early publisher of children's books. In which the publisher requested Oliver Goldsmith to write books for children. The Newbery medal is an award given to the most outstanding book for children published each year, judged by the Library association. They also portrayed a scene in a home, showing how parents could encourage the children's interest in books.

Miss Arts Lawrence discussed suitable books for children from pre-school age until eight years old. Books for the child from 8 to 12 were considered by Mrs. Glenn Wagner.

Mrs. Lloyd Pierce discussed books for the adolescent age.

"Tall Tales and Humorous Stories" was considered by Lyle Kiddle.

Mrs. J. T. Williamson gave a brief review of the different children's magazines available.

"Acquainting Children With Books in the Home" was the subject of a short talk by Dr. J. L. Ingle. He stated that this might be accomplished by parents acquainting themselves with the types of worthy books, have them available for the children, and discuss them with the children. He explained the value of a well-written, well-illustrated encyclopedia to interest both types of children—the chronic reader and the child whose interest lies in outdoor activities. He stated that the public library has a number of books for children, and that Miss Doty will check over any list of books owned by parents and advise which are of value for the child.

A feature of the program were attractively arranged tables displaying the various types of books discussed during the evening.

There is a membership tree, of which each branch represents a room of the school, and there is a leaf on the branch for each member of the association for that room. Seventy-one leaves are on the tree to date.
