Fatal Riot In "City of Peace" Kills 12 Today

Machine-Gun Fire Turned on Hissing Crowd; Bitter Political Agitation Cause of Riot.

GENEVA, Nov. 10 (AP)—The tragedy of a riot, which echoed through the "city of peace" today after a company of young recruits had turned machine guns on a hissing crowd, killing 12 men and wounding 70 persons. The angry mob killed one soldier.

The disturbance came last night as the climax of weeks of bitter political agitation between socialists and the local Geneva government.

It began in front of community hall where an anti-socialist political meeting was being held. When the hall became full, the gardeners closed the doors, but the crowd broke through.

Sensing trouble, authorities ordered the young troops which previously had been called from Lausanne, to march to the scene. As soon as they appeared the crowd began hissing and calling them "children's troops."

Machine Gun Fired

Suddenly there came a burst of machine-gun fire. Part of the crowd thought blanks were being discharged, but others slumped to the ground.

Severe Winds In Northeast Cause Loss to Shipping

BOSTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—An increase in the intensity of a heavy northeast storm which has scourged the coast for the past three days, today caused widespread damage, delayed shipping, sent mountainous seas crashing against waterfronts and resulted in suspension of classes in schools of this city and many other communities.

COAST BATTERED

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 10 (AP)—Lashed by winds of gale force, ocean waves battered the New Jersey shore today, breaking over the beach, causing extensive damage and paralyzing motor and rail traffic to many of the resort cities.

Whipped by the high wind, tide waters swept across the dunes, washed out shore bungalows, and flooded main highways. Trains were delayed. Waves washed over the sea wall at Monmouth Beach.

The rising tide broke the coast guard station at Little Egg harbor and Commander S. R. Lands gave orders to abandon it. The guardsmen took refuge on the mainland at Tuckerton, leaving the tide, driven by a strong northeaster, would wash the station away.

SNOW IN ROCKIES

CABINET TO BE SELECTED SOON, REPORT

President-Elect to Devote Next Four Months to Making Preparations.

HOOVER "TIRED" AFTER CAMPAIGN

President, However, Will Have Republican Senate Until After Fourth of March.

Their victory swelling with every additional return on Tuesday's tremendous vote, America's new Democratic leaders faced today four months of arduous preparation for the responsibility of piloting the government.

A free hand in directing the country was given President-elect Roosevelt by election of a house three to one Democratic, and a senate controlled by his party, 69 to 30. This smashing victory only emphasized the significance of his never-before attained electoral vote of 472 to 59 for President Hoover.

The popular vote kept mounting toward record figures with 20,161,000 recorded for the winner and 14,184,867 for Hoover, from approximately three-fourths of the country's voting districts.

Under this amazing grant of power, Roosevelt expressed his appreciation by saying "this clear mandate shall not be forgotten."

He termed it "a national expression of liberal thought."

Alfred H. Hays, informed the congressional leaders of his party that the time from now until March 4 will be devoted to creating the machinery required for the Democratic administration, making the cabinet, a major task in which his associates say he may break one more precedent by announcing his make up considerably before inauguration.

He proposes to continue intensive consultation with experts on industry, agriculture and finance, formulated by the Associated Press.

GALSWORTHY IS WINNER OF NOBEL PRIZE

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Nov. 10 (AP)—The 1932 Nobel prize for literature was bestowed today upon John Galsworthy, the British novelist and dramatist.

The author of "The Forsyte Saga" had been mentioned in newspaper predictions as the probable recipient of the award.

Last year's prize, worth about \$31,000, was won by Erik A. Karlfeldt, of Sweden. Sinclair Lewis, who received the prize in 1930, was the first American to be so honored.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10 (AP)—Election of Walter M. Pierce, ex-governor, and present Democratic national committeeman from Oregon, and defeat of the Republican representative Robert R. Butler who has served in congress from the second Oregon district since 1928, became assured today. Tabulations by the Associated Press showed Pierce's ever-growing majority was a safe one.

With 372 precincts out of the 440 in the district accounted for, Pierce had 24,443 voters, and Butler 20,147.

Butler, resident of The Dalles, was elected to congress in 1928 to succeed the veteran congressman Nicholas J. Sinnott, resigned. He was re-elected in 1930. Butler is an attorney and was several times a member of the state senate before going to Washington, D. C.

40 Years of Public Life

Pierce, 71 years old, rancher of the great Eastern Oregon livestock country, has for more than 40 years been identified with Oregon's political life. After serving twice in the senate—the first time in 1922, he was a member of the state tax commission, a member of Oregon State college, and finally, in 1922, he was elected governor and took much pride in the mention of him as "a farmer-governor."

The new congressman was born at Morris, Ill., in 1861, came to Oregon in 1883, was admitted to the bar in 1893. He is fond of relating that the first job he had in Oregon was a farm hand in Umatilla county.
