La Grande Defeats Pendleton at Round-Up City, 12 to 6

IRWIN'S LONG RUN FEATURE OF GAME

La Grande High Anxious to Play Either Medford or Hood River; Negotiations Opened

HOOD RIVER ANSWERS

In response to a telegram from La Grande challenging Hood River or Medford to a game next week to determine which football eleven shall play Jefferson High in Portland Thanksgiving day, Principal A. L. Orsapp received a telegram about noon today from Hood River, saying: "Considering your challenge, please mail us your record by Monday." No answer had been received early this afternoon from Medford.

BUCKAROO opposition was tough yesterday afternoon at Pendleton, but not quite tough enough, and La Grande High school took possession of its second Eastern Oregon championship in three years by defeating the Pendleton eleven 12 to 6 in an exciting contest.

The feature of the game and the score that counted at 6 all came on the opening kickoff of the second half, when Huey Irwin, La Grande end, took the ball on his own 30-yard line and raced 70 yards to a touchdown. His interference forced quickly and carried him past the bulk of the Pendleton team, but it was up to Huey to outstrip the Pendleton quarter—the fastest Buck on the field—and Huey delivered.

The winning score was made in the fourth quarter when the Tigers marched down the field with Saller and Roe alternating at running the ends. Roe was carrying the ball when the goal line was crossed. One attempt at goal kick went wide and the other was blocked.

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SPRINGFIELD WOMAN SLAIN BY GUN FIRE

Authorities were at a loss to account for the attack. Mrs. Miranda was a leader in the Italian colony here and had a good reputation.

Salt Lake City Feels Earthquake

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 12 (AP)—Several residents here reported to newspapers today they felt heavy earth shocks about 2:45 a. m. Pictures were knocked awry on the walls, doors thrown open and windows rattled, they said.

The shock apparently was more severe in the eastern part of the city near the Wasatch mountain range, which led to a theory that a slipping of the Wasatch fault had caused the disturbance.

Armistice Day Celebrated In City Yesterday

Parade Opens Program, Followed by Dinner, Football Game and a Dance in the Evening

The tramp of marching feet which echoed down Adams avenue yesterday morning at 11 o'clock recalled to the spectators the days of '17 and '18 when the boys in khaki marched off to the World War in France and returned, in fewer numbers, but victorious. The signing of the Armistice was celebrated and the war dead honored at fitting ceremonies yesterday. C. P. Holbrook was general chairman of the entire celebration.

The G. A. R. colors, wafted by a slight breeze which stirred in the crisp weather, led the parade, carried by national guard color bearers in trim regulation uniforms. La Grande's remaining Civil War veterans rode in the line of march and were followed by veterans of later wars, the band, Boy Scouts, and the national guard companies of La Grande and Union.

The Young Democratic League of Eastern Oregon comprising 11 counties, has just completed a survey regarding the governorship of 1934, according to Otto Baumgart, chairman on organization.

The statement issued by the league follows:

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To Publish Debt Notes

U. S. A. Receives Messages From Britain, France

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—The many and varied speculations of the contents of the British and French debt notes has caused the state department to decide to make them public for Monday morning papers. This decision was reached today after consultation with the British and French embassies. Simultaneous publication will be made in Europe.

Early publication was decided on to squelch reports termed misleading.

Secrecy Was Expected

At first it seemed likely the notes would be kept secret until President Hoover's arrival in Washington. Meantime, Secretary Stimson and his assistants as well as the British and French embassy staffs refused to answer questions as to whether an extension of the moratorium is definitely asked or overtures are made in the notes for a general reconsideration of war debt settlements without a request for suspension of the payments totaling more than \$123,000,000 due this country from ten European powers on December 15.

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HOOVER WILL CONTINUE IN HIS EFFORTS

President Pledges Co-operation to Continue Economic Recovery

SPEAKS TODAY AT GLENDALE, CAL.

Predicts that Republicans 'Will Return to Power'; Thanks Those Who Aided His Campaign

With President Hoover en route to Washington from Glendale, Cal., Nov. 12 (AP)—President Hoover broke his return journey to the White House today with a speech here pledging co-operation to continue economic recovery.

Speaking from the rear platform of his train, the executive said:

"If we are to continue the recovery so evidently in progress during the past few months by overcoming the many difficulties which still confront us, we must have continued unity in constructive action all along the economic front."

"I shall work for that unity during the remaining four months of this administration. Furthermore, it is our duty after the 4th of March to co-operate with our opponents in every sound measure for the restoration of prosperity."

Mr. Hoover declared he was returning early to Washington from his home in Palo Alto, Cal., "in special concern that the measures and instrumentalities which we have in motion on an entirely non-partisan basis shall continue to function vigorously and contribute their utmost."

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Depository Plan Is Discussed At Meeting Friday

A plan for a La Grande depository to handle cash and checks in lieu of a local bank was outlined at a meeting at the Sacajawea Inn last night by G. M. Byrkit. About 50 attended and many of them approved the plan. Another meeting was to be held this afternoon.

In brief, it would be a depository to receive and pay out funds, with the balance of deposits to be invested in registered United States government bonds, and with no other investments contemplated. No capital stock, stockholders or loans to firms or individuals would be provided for and sufficient cash would be maintained to handle daily checks from the members.

"The American Express company's system of handling exchange would probably be used first because of its security and second, its wide distribution of agencies," it was said.

Canvass of Votes Under Way Today

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Mountaineers Conclude Season With 12 to 0 Victory Over Lewiston Team

ARTING around Lewiston's right end on a reverse, Leonard Roe, Mountaineers half-back, raced 16 yards just inside the sidelines in the third quarter yesterday afternoon to scoring territory, giving the E. O. N. a 6 to 0 lead over their traditional rivals from the Idaho city. Then, in the closing period, just to put the victory on ice, Roe slipped away—again around end and from regular formation—and raced from the 25-yard line to the one-yard stripe, and on the next play stepped over tackle for a second touchdown. That was all, but an Armistice day crowd in La Grande had plenty for which to celebrate, as the 12 to 0 win was the first victory over Lewiston in four years.

It acted as a fitting climax to the Normal school's second most successful football season. Back in 1929, the first year of the institution, the Mountaineers won the state normal school title by defeating Monmouth 17 to 7 and also scored victories over College of Idaho and Whitman. 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President-elect Recovering From Cold at Albany

F. R. Is "Much Improved"—Hoped to Continue With His Correspondence Today

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 12 (AP)—President-elect Roosevelt, suffering from a cold, was "much improved," his staff at the executive mansion said today.

Although he had thrown off the worst effects of the cold he contracted in the closing, arduous days of the presidential campaign, Mrs. Roosevelt prevailed upon him to remain in bed for the second day.

Visitors at the mansion were asked to put off their engagements with Mr. Roosevelt to allow him a complete rest over the weekend.

Normal Temperature

The slight temperature he had yesterday had disappeared today. Mr. Roosevelt was attended yesterday by the Roosevelt physician in Albany, Dr. L. W. Gorham. The doctor had not called at the mansion during the morning today.

Mr. Roosevelt hoped to be able to continue today, with his secretary at his bedside, some of the correspondence he dictated yesterday when he was not sleeping or resting. He spent part of the day reading more of the congratulatory messages that have been pouring in since his election. To some of these he dictated replies.

The governor thought until yesterday that he had shaken off the cold, contracted during the last day of his campaign when he rode bareheaded in an open car during a rain. He had planned to spend this weekend at his Hyde Park residence, but cancelled the trip. To get to Hyde Park he would have had to drive through a cold rain.

The weekend will permit the governor to "catch up," as he said, on his sleep. He said the day after his election that he was tired but "never felt better." From the day he flew to Chicago in July to accept the Democratic nomination, his relentless program tired his staff and the newspapermen who traveled with him, but the governor never expressed weariness.

At the end of his swing through some of the southern states shortly before election, he lost his voice for a few hours after making speeches from an observation platform on a rainy day in North Carolina and Virginia, but he quickly recovered.

When the governor returns to his desk he plans to proceed with preparation of the state budget, and after about a week to leave for Warm Springs to remain there until early in December.

Senator Nye In Hospital; Hurt In Car Accident

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 12 (AP)—United States Senator Gerald P. Nye, of North Dakota, was brought to a hospital today after being injured when his automobile overturned on a sharp curve near Hudson, Wis. Physicians said he was not seriously injured.

He was taken to the X-ray room of the hospital to determine the exact extent of his injuries.

With David R. Horlick of Fargo, who was accompanying him to Chicago, Senator Nye was picked out of the wreckage of his car by a passing motorist and taken to Hudson, Wis. Two miles from where he was injured.

There a physician gave him first aid and then brought him here.

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'WHITE COLLAR' WORKERS DUE TO LOSE JOBS

MOSCOW, Nov. 12 (AP)—Soviet Russia began a campaign to purge the government of excessive employees today with orders to discharge between 25,000 and 30,000 "white collar workers" in government departments and bureaus.

The order was issued by the Moscow labor department for the purpose of eliminating the "great cluster of minor employees in virtually every government bureau," which has been held chiefly responsible for enormous inefficiency and bureaucracy in most of the central government and economic organizations.

The discharged workers will be given 12 days notice after which they will be registered by the labor bureau for new jobs. It is expected they will be assigned to farms and factories needing workers.

Prohibition Agents Raid Speakeasies

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 12 (AP)—Federal prohibition agents raided nine speakeasies last night, arrested 14 persons and seized beer, whiskey and alcohol.

The raid came on the eve of the Wisconsin-Minnesota football game and many of the wet spots were frequented by students. The students were not molested.

24 Miners Killed In England Today

WIGAN, Lancashire, England, Nov. 12 (AP)—Twenty-four miners were killed early today in an explosion at the Edgemoor colliery at Ashton-in-Makerfield.

The accident occurred while 100 men were working in the colliery on the night shift.

GIVES UP SPEED TRIP

COLUMBUS, Nov. 12 (AP)—An attempt by Col. Roscoe Turner to establish a new transcontinental round-trip air record was abandoned here this afternoon when the colonel blew a tire in landing his monoplane at Fort Columbus.

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
