ST. MARY'S WINS FROM U. C. L. A. IN ARMISTICE GAME

Bruins Remain in Running for Coast Conference Honors With Trojan Eleven, However

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12 (AP)—Written off the list of unbeaten teams by St. Mary's blushing Gaels, the University of California at Los Angeles football team turned today toward the Pacific coast conference race in which it is joint leader.

Coach Edward (Slip) Madigan's team won the game in the first quarter on the Bruins yesterday 14 to 7, a stinging defeat a year ago and thereby found consolation in some degree for the setback Fordham meted out a week ago.

Crowd of 55,000 Thrilled
There was little question of St. Mary's superiority yesterday, but the Bruins passing attack, which opened the scoring of the game and stood out as a threat all afternoon, kept the crowd of 55,000 persons in an uproar.

Coach Bill Spaulding's team had one scoring chance and made it good. With the ball on the Gaels 45 yard line, Mike Frankovich rifled a long pass to Bobby Decker, who caught the ball on the run 20 yards from the goal line and crossed unmolested. That was early in the second period.

St. Mary's had been on the Uclan 6 and 10 yard lines in the first period but couldn't muster up the offensive to go across.

Two Bad Punts
Two bad punts by Decker paved the way for the Gaels to win the game. Late in the second quarter Decker's kick from behind his goal line was partially blocked and rolled dead on the ten yard line.

On the first play Charles Baird, who played as brilliant a game as his pants were red, ran left end for a touchdown.

Neither team could gain the advantage in the third quarter, but in the final period another punt which rolled out of bounds in mid-field put the Gaels in the position they were seeking.

Bill Beasley, who shared ball carrying honors of the day with Baird, broke away for 20 yards, snaking himself loose from would-be tacklers almost all the way. The two combined for a first down on the 20-yard line and then Beasley passed to George Cantrius for another first down on the 8 yard line.

Beasley's Score Wins
Here Beasley took the ball and broke through the line for the winning touchdown. The rest of the afternoon was spent with Frankovich trying to connect with his accurate forward passes and the Gaels successfully preventing his doing so.

St. Mary's collected 257 yards, 62 on passes, and U. C. L. A. 113 yards with 48 on two completed passes. Five Bruin tosses were intercepted while St. Mary's completed 4 of 8 and had one interception. Despite his two bad punts, Decker averaged 33.6 yards on his punts against 31 for the Gaels.

Baird clicked off 91 yards and Beasley 87 to become leading ground gainers.

Big Oregon Team Facing Trojans In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12 (AP)—University of Southern California's football team, unbeaten in sixteen starts following the rocky road toward another national championship picked today by a band of giants from Oregon.

With such big, strong men as Mike Mikulak, 202 pound fullback, Stan Kostka, 212 pound half, and Mark Temple, a deceptive Trojan defense, which has allowed only one touchdown to leak through this fall, may be tried to its limit.

On the Webfoot side of the ledger is a sturdy, rugged line and backfield in all good shape. The Trojans will miss Ray Sparling, their choice left end who does a lot of running with the ball.

Whatever loss this may be to Coach Howard Jones' team, the prevailing weather conditions should help Troy in the defense of its Pacific Coast and national titles, for the heat is expected to weaken the team from the Northwest.

Coach Jones, worried over the possibility of the Webfoot defense being too much for his eleven's running plays, has polished up on passing attack this week with the idea of taking to the airbines if necessary, for a victory.

Except for the absence of Sparling, who will be replaced by Julius Beasly, the Trojan lineup will be much the same as the one which won from California here a week ago. Johnny Dye may start at right guard instead of Larry Stevens.

BARNEY ROSS CONQUEROR OF GOLDIE HESS

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 (AP)—Goldie Hess, with the other boys that Barney Ross, with the other boys that Barney Ross, Chicago's candidate for the world lightweight championship, has conquered.

Ross last night did everything, but knock Hess out in their ten round bout at the Chicago stadium, and was credited with winning every round. Hess had little more than an overhead right swing to offer in the way of an attack and took a terrific beating, as the sharpshooting Ross jabbed, hooked, crossed and up-percutted him almost without interruption.

The Chicago youngster had a chance for a knockout in the third round when he hammered Hess with both hands to the head along the ropes, but Goldie hid behind his elbows to weather the barrage, and employed that method of defense to last out the ten rounds.

In the ten round semi-final, Dave Shude, veteran California middleweight, outpointed Sammy Slaughter of Terre Haute, Ind. Bud Taylor's negro protege, to wipe out a previous defeat, and in the other scheduled ten rounder, Frankie Battaglia of Winnipeg, Man., won by a technical knockout over young Terry of Trenton, N. J. in the seventh round.

The attendance was about 2000, with receipts of approximately \$17,000.

WEST COAST'S ARMY, NAVY IN BATTLE FRIDAY

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 12 (AP)—West Coast Army's stubborn defense cracked before the West Coast Navy's charges in their annual Armistice day football game here yesterday to give the sailors a 30 to 0 victory.

The navy team climaxed its performance by scoring three touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

Nearly 70,000 spectators filled Memorial stadium at the University of California to watch the game and a military spectacle including marching bands and uniformed units of soldiers and sailors.

checking upon the possible effect on the organization for the 1933 session. It is believed Fred E. Kiddle, of Island City, will have little difficulty in retaining his support for president of the senate, but the status of Earl H. Snell, of Arlington, who claimed sufficient support before the election for speaker of the house, is the cause of speculation.

Of the personnel of the 1931 session who were acquainted with Snell and many of whom were on his list of supporters for speakership, only 17 were returned. The 48 new members therefore could take control. However Snell has already contacted some of these and his election still appears a sure event.

Eddy's Defeat an Upset
The greatest upset in the senatorial election was the defeat of B. L. Eddy, of Roseburg, a veteran of many sessions and one of the leaders in the upper house. Walter F. Fisher, a member of the house in the 1931 session, and a Democrat, defeated Eddy.

Others who will be missed in the 1933 meeting will be Colon R. Eberhard of La Grande, defeated by Henry L. Hess, Democrat; Willard L. Marks, president of the last senate, who resigned several months ago; Charles Hall, who moved out of his district of Coos and Curry county and was replaced by John D. Goes, Democrat of Marshfield.

Senator B. W. Johnson of Benton and Polk counties, who died during the past year, will be replaced by J. N. McFadden, Democrat. Edward Schulerich of Hillsboro will not be back, Allen, Democrat, taking his seat.

Longman Returned
Frank J. Longman, speaker of the house at the last session, was one of the few veterans who was returned to that chamber. He headed the list from Multnomah county. K. K. Kubli, former member of the house, will be back from Multnomah. Herbert Gordon, Dorris, and John H. Lewis were the others returned by Multnomah county out of 13 elected.

The remaining veterans in the lower house are scattered.

George P. Winslow was unopposed in Tillamook county, and will be back in his seat. Harvey Wells from Clatsop and Multnomah county will likewise be back for the 1933 session. Arthur McPhillips, Democrat from Yamhill county, a consistent "no" voter in the 1931 session, was returned. Romeo Gouley will be the only one of four to return from Marion county.

On the other hand, the newcomers were selected. Hector Macpherson, co-author of the Zorn-Macpherson school moving bill which was overwhelmingly defeated, will not be back to join him from that county.

Others who were returned include Earl H. Hill and E. A. McCormack of Lane, B. P. Nichols of Douglas, Earl B. Day of Jackson, E. W. Snell, candidate for speaker, from Arlington; Victor Eckley of Union; L. P. Allen of Wallawa; James H. E. Scott of Umatilla and W. E. Stockdale of Grant and Harney.

construction of the High school building. The desirability of having someone on the board widely experienced in that line of endeavor is obvious and was emphasized at our meeting held day before yesterday. Furthermore, it seems desirable to me, particularly at the present time, that the heavier taxpayers have representation on the board.

"The recent destruction of the high school building has compelled the board to give an enormous amount of extra time to its duties which has compelled me, as one of the board, to neglect my private business to an extreme I cannot afford."

"Believing, for the foregoing reasons, that it is for the best interest of the school district, I hereby tender my resignation as a member of the board of directors of this district to take effect immediately."

The board of directors hired Al Heineke as foreman of the work at the La Grande High school, which will be repaired after having been damaged by fire early in September, and the walls will be torn down immediately. The work will progress as rapidly as possible in the future.

ITALY BELIEVED TO ACT
PARIS, Nov. 12 (AP)—Notes dealing with payments of war debts already have been presented to the American government by France and Great Britain, and it is reported that similar communications may be expected from Italy and Belgium, but a foreign office official asserted this morning that France had joined in no collective action concerning the debt issue.

ing 33 yards. On the next play Taggart, fullback, started around behind his interference in a thrust at La Grande's left end. A Mountaineer line man knifed through and forced Taggart back. He stopped, hesitated, about faced and raced 42 yards down the field to La Grande's 15 before he was stopped. Taggart made two yards on the next play and then three forward passing attempts went for nought and E. O. N. took the ball on its own 24-yard line. Roe's first touchdown came a few minutes later. Hanks intercepted a Lewiston pass on the Idaho 48-yard line and returned it three yards. Then Roe, in two plays, went to the 15-yard line. He was held for no gain and so was Hanks, but on third down Roe scored. Hanks' kick for the point went wide.

The nearest Lewiston came to scoring in the fourth half was when a desperate forward passing attack made two first downs and pierced to La Grande's 32. A moment later Miles intercepted a pass on his 20 and shortly before the game ended skinned his own left end for 10 yards and a first down.

E. O. N. Line Stars
The Mountaineer line was in rare form yesterday, breaking up Lewiston thrusts time after time, often for big losses. On two successive plays in the last quarter Anderson, Lewiston's fastest back and best ground gainer, was thrown for 11 and 9-yard losses in succession. Lewiston's offensive simply could not click for more than a moment against the E. O. N. forwards, and if the line didn't stop the ball carrier, the secondary took care of him. Hard tackling was the rule and at times the game became somewhat rough, with several 15-yard penalties being called, most them against Lewiston.

In ground gaining, Roe stood out but Lassen, captain for the day, tipped the Lewiston line for nice gains often, and his defense work was very good. The soft, wet field held down forward passing on both teams, although both teams resorted to the air frequently. La Grande's defense broke up several Lewiston thrusts which might have been turned into touchdowns if they had been completed.

The entire Mountaineer squad—and both eleven saw service—played fine ball, both on offense and defense, winding up the season with one of the best performances of the year.

In first downs, La Grande chalked up 10 to Lewiston's eight, and of the latter, half were from forward passes. Eight of La Grande's first downs were from running plays, one from a penalty and one from a forward pass, Hanks to Burnett.
