Large Group Hears Program of Music

A large crowd enjoyed the Neighborhood Music club program last night when Miss Hilda Anthony and Miss Ida McMeekin presented a program commencing Haydn, the musical composer, in the La Grande hotel gold room. Musical circles throughout the United States and Europe are this year celebrating the bi-centennial of his birth and the program was in keeping with the event.

Haydn was born in Rohrau, on the borders of Hungary and Austria, in 1732. Because of his excellence of voice he was appointed as a choir boy at St. Stephen's church, Vienna. "Scenes From the Childhood of Haydn," by James Francis Cooke, was presented in three episodes by a group of children, and Miss McMeekin read the continuity between the three acts which pictured him in his home, in the cathedral and in the school. Taking part in the playlet were Verna Lee Hanford, Patricia Ann Hall, Avery Millering, Bob Johnson, Robert Hogensen, Wilfred Zurbrick, John Walton, Jack Murphy, David Douglas, Wayne Williamson and Clifford Smith. Haydn composed a number of operas, oratorios and is said to be the originator of the symphony and of the stringed quartet. From his compositions numbers were presented last night.

Mrs. Florence Lynch Miller played "Arietta" and "The Oxen Minuet," both by Haydn. Miss Helen Williams played a piano solo, "Sonata D. Major" in three movements, allegro con brio, largo e sostenuto and presto ma non troppo.
