

La Grande To Play At The Dalles Next Friday Afternoon

TIGERS PRESSING CLAIM FOR GAME FOR STATE TITLE

Victory Over The Dalles Would Make La Grande Record Too Strong to be Ignored.

Although Hood River and Medford, two of the outstanding contenders for a state championship in high school football circles in Oregon, have scheduled a game for next Saturday, both ignoring La Grande's challenge, the Tigers still have a chance for that Turkey day title game in Multnomah stadium against Jefferson High of Portland.

Late yesterday afternoon a game was scheduled with The Dalles, to be played at The Dalles next Friday afternoon, and inasmuch as the Indians are considered on par with Hood River, a victory for La Grande would leave it the outstanding team in Eastern Oregon—and this time Eastern Oregon would mean all of the state east of the Cascades. A victory for the Tiger would rank it as stronger than Hood River, as the Apple Pickers were held to a scoreless tie by The Dalles.

Situation Complicated. The situation is complicated, to say the least. Jefferson High is assured of being one of the two teams in the Thanksgiving day game by virtue of its exceptionally good record and the fact it was crowned state champion in 1931, due to the marvelous work of Grayson and his team mates. Then there are four other outstanding teams from which to pick an opponent: Medford, La Grande, Hood River and The Dalles. Actually, The Dalles is not likely to be considered because it was required to forfeit games it played earlier in the season—including the tie score with Hood River—because one of its players was judged to be ineligible.

But The Dalles was not suspended and continues its season without the ineligible man. And the fact remains that the Indians have been undefeated in both Oregon and Washington, a record equally as good as Hood River's. Medford, while not defeated, has a weak spot on its record, having nosed out Grants Pass only 7 to 6.

Several Chances. There are several chances for La Grande, always depending, of course, on its ability to defeat The Dalles, which will be tested Friday.

1. If Hood River and Medford should tie Saturday, La Grande would be in a strategic position to be selected for the Portland game. 2. If Hood River wins from Medford, and the state board should decide Swanson, fullback, whom The Dalles has protested, as ineligible, La Grande would probably get the call. 3. If both Hood River and La Grande were to win, or if both Medford and La Grande were to win, the Tigers would have probably a 50-50 chance for the Portland game, at least in theory.

It's all a gamble, of course, but La Grande school authorities, the football team, the student body and the town in general unite in regarding it as a logical thing to do under the circumstances. One thing is certain, a La Grande victory over The Dalles would put the Tigers so strongly in the running that their claim, whether a Portland game resulted or not, would be so strong the state as a whole could not ignore it.

Coach Ira Woodie, with the news of the new schedule, immediately began preparing his squad for the contest Friday. In all likelihood, the Tigers will leave here Thursday evening for The Dalles, to be ready for

Ruppert Talks Beer, Baseball And Babe Ruth

FRENCH LIQ. Ind., Nov. 15.—Beer, baseball and Babe Ruth were in the mind of Colonel Jacob Ruppert of New York today.

Not that the three subjects are related to one another, but it happens the colonel is president of the United States Brewers association, owns the world champion New York Yankee baseball club, and has to get the famous slugger's signature on a new contract.

Ruppert is at French Lick for his annual 21-day rest. He thinks the Yankees have a great chance to win the American league pennant in 1933 and does not anticipate any trouble in signing the highest salaried player in history.

"Babe's all right; he will sign at the right time," Ruppert said. Return of real beer interests the colonel more than anything else right now. He believes the Volstead act will be modified during the short term of congress to permit manufacture of the drink.

Vanderbilt And Tulane In Row; "Booing" Cause

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 15.—Vanderbilt has severed athletic relations with Tulane over the "booing" it got when the Commodores tied the Green Wave in New Orleans early this season.

Russ Cohen, member of Vanderbilt's coaching staff and former head coach of Louisiana State university, announced the break last night and said Louisiana State would replace Tulane on Vanderbilt's 1933 schedule.

The severance with Tulane, he explained, resulted from the "booing" and the insistence on the part of Tulane officials that Vandy return to New Orleans for any future contests. Cohen engineered the negotiations with L. S. U., and said officials had telegraphed last night they would play Vandy Oct. 28, 1933, in Baton Rouge.

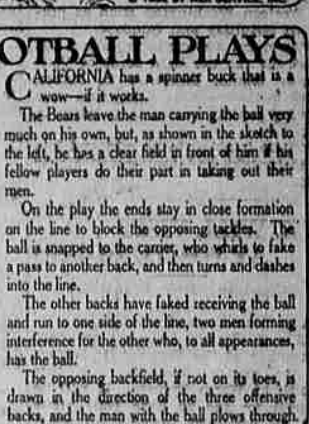
