

Medford High to Play Jefferson Eleven Thanksgiving

ALL HOOD RIVER WINS FORFEITED BY BOARD ACTION

Tom Swanson, Apple Picker Fullback, Found Ineligible at Executive Meeting Wednesday.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 17 (AP)—It will be Medford High school vs. Jefferson High school here Thanksgiving day for the mythical High school football championship of Oregon.

Games played by Hood River were ordered forfeited yesterday by the state high school athletic association, and this threw affairs into a turmoil for several hours until after much consultation and deliberation Medford and Jefferson of Portland were selected for the title match.

Hood River was to have met Medford Saturday, with the victor to play Jefferson here. But when the board yesterday affirmed that Tom Swanson, Hood River fullback, was found ineligible, all games in which Hood River played during the season were declared forfeited to opposing eleven.

The board said Medford may play Hood River Saturday at Medford if it chooses, according to a schedule already announced, but it was considered here to be doubtful whether the game would be played.

Rosenbloom Wins From John Lewis

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17 (AP)—Maxie Rosenbloom, of New York, world's light heavyweight champion, worked hard for ten rounds here last night to take a ten-round decision from John Henry Lewis, Phoenix, Ariz.

Rosenbloom needed all his courage and experience to repel the sensational negro, who is only 19 years old. The champion took heavy punishment at times, but dealt out enough on his own account to win five rounds. Lewis took three, the fourth, seventh and eighth. The third and tenth were even. Rosenbloom weighed 181; Lewis 177 1/2.

Charlie Gelbert Hunting Victim

CHAMBERSBURG, Pa., Nov. 17 (AP)—Charlie Gelbert, St. Louis Cardinal shortstop, was in a hospital today with a bullet wound in the left leg as a result of a hunting accident.

Gelbert's gun was accidentally discharged as he tripped over a vine while gunning yesterday in the mountains near McConnellsburg. The pellets inflicted a wound six inches long, in his leg between the knee and ankle. His condition is not serious.

BIG TEN COACHES IN GOOD SEASON

Doc Spears, at Wisconsin, Gives Team Best Record Since 1912.

CHICAGO, Nov. 17 (AP)—It looks like a tough, dull winter for the notorious "drug store" coaches of the Big Ten football world.

Armed with dynamite, figures and arguments a month ago for bigger and better coaches at their respective campuses, the disastres have been victimized by a series of comebacks by their football targets. Today, with the close of the Big Ten season one game away, virtually every coach in the conference seems assured of at least another season of master minding.

This is how the Big Ten coaching situation looked today:

Wisconsin: In his first season at Wisconsin, Coach Clarence "Doc" Spears has become the most talked of mentor in the conference. Bringing order out of chaos, "Doc" led the Badgers to perhaps their happiest season since the championship year of 1912. Only a one point defeat by Purdue and the tie at Ohio State against the 1932 record.

Illinois: Coach Bob Zuppke, off to a bad start, has made a great finish to stretch Illini imaginations for 1933.

Ohio State: They're still after Coach Sam Williamson but he and his team are making another great finish, defeating Northwestern and Pennsylvania after tying Indiana, Pittsburgh and Wisconsin and losing to Michigan. The Buckeyes also have learned that it was not disgrace to be tied by Wisconsin and an honor to hold Pitt.

Northwestern: Coach Dick Hanley, despite his worst year, is looking forward to meet the great coach and the Wildcat made solidly behind him.

Iowa: Although Iowa alumni have adopted the "who cares?" attitude, Coach Ossie Solem has made good with a fine finish. His system and optimism have renewed Hawkeye hopes for '33.

Minnesota: The defeat by Wisconsin was a blow to Bernie Bierman in his first year but he's had a good season and can crown it Saturday with the thanks of Purdue by defeating Michigan.

Michigan: Coach Harry Kipke is sitting pretty with a championship within his grasp.

Purdue: Coach Noble Kizer is making them forget his predecessor, Jimmie Phelan, with one of the best coached teams in football.

Indiana: There are rumors of disension among the Monday morning coaches at Indiana but a victory over Purdue Saturday would make the season a great one for the Hoosiers and Coach Hayes.

Chicago: Everyone close to Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg thinks he'll be back next season despite the retirement rule. Defeated by Purdue and Michigan were expected but the Illinois victory was an upset.

As Edward "Slip" Madigan rolled back west with his battered Gaels of St. Mary's, there was just one thing about the Fordham beating in New York he couldn't understand.

Peter Coyle had failed Notre Dame and its traditions for the first time.

INTRODUCING PETER

Peter is a slim, dark man who must be somewhere in his forties, an employe of the city of New Haven, Conn. He's Notre Dame's two-eyed Connolly.

One day when Knute Rockne and Notre Dame were riding the heights together, Peter managed to attach himself to the great Scandinavian. Once "in" he never could be shaken loose. He became Notre Dame's unofficial mascot in the east, for once Peter arrived, Notre Dame couldn't lose.

Peter took it all very seriously. For days before a big game in New York he would bombard Rockne with messages, carrying the coach he would be there to help, walking if necessary.

This never failed to loosen Knute's heart of pocketbook. Sure enough, Peter would be there, carrying Knute's bags, pulling Rock off into a corner to advise him, winding up always on the Notre Dame bench for the game.

HE MEETS MADIGAN

In time, Peter broadened his allegiance to include the men who had played under the great coach, and now are coaches in their own right. Thus did he come in contact with Madigan.

The first time "Slip" scheduled a game in the east, Knute said to him: "A fellow will come up to you in New York, put his hand up to shield

his mouth, and whisper hoarsely and confidently into your ear, 'Hello Slip, old boy, old boy.' That will be Peter Coyle. Put him on the bench. He's good luck."

Everything happened just as Knute predicted. But Peter had trouble getting to the half park. He arrived between halves with St. Mary's trailing Fordham 12 to 0. St. Mary's promptly came back in the second half to win 20 to 12.

WHERE DUTY CALLS

Noble Kizer brought Purdue to New York to play New York university the same day Jimmy Crowley was in the east with his Michigan State team tackling Syracuse. Peter was torn between two duties.

Finally he wired Crowley his decision.

"I helped you beat Fordham last week. Kizer and Purdue need me this Saturday."

To Kizer he sent this telegram: "Hitch-hiking from New Haven to help with team. Save me some breakfast."

So Madigan, with Peter meeting St. Mary's on arrival at New York this year, had every reason to believe the Fordham game was as good as won. Peter never had failed.

But as the team rolled back home, beaten 14 to 0, "Slip" had real reason to wonder. It's just possible Peter will be buying his own breakfast on Saturdays next season.
