

Double Tragedy Avoided Tuesday At Mt. Emily Mill

A double tragedy was narrowly avoided Tuesday afternoon at the millpond of the Mt. Emily mill when a group of boys was swimming and playing on the logs there.

A boy 8 or 10 years of age, named Comstock, was playing on a small log when it sank with him. He was unable to swim.

Two workmen at the mill, C. R. Tiffany and H. H. Tiffany, brothers, heard the screams of the children and ran to their aid. C. R. Tiffany in attempting to reach the Comstock boy slipped and struck his head on a log, almost knocking him unconscious and endangering his own life.

H. H. Tiffany, then dashed in and

rescued both his brother and the Comstock boy from the waters of the pond. C. R. Tiffany soon recovered from the shock, but the boy had to be worked over for several minutes before he was restored.

A. J. Stange, of the Mt. Emily mill, wishes to warn parents of the dangers existing in allowing their children to play in the millpond, where they are not properly supervised or protected.

time it stops under the arc lights of Soldier Field Saturday night. Almost every event will offer such keen competition that record or near record time will be required for victory. The thrills of the track and field meet will include:

Ralph Metcalfe, of Marquette, the world's record holder in the dashes, matching strides against one of the fastest fields ever assembled.

A duel between Bill Miller, Stanford Olympic champion, in the pole vault and his arch rival, Bill Graber of the Trojan squad, American record holder with a leap of 14 feet 4 3/4 inches.

A hurdles race between Jack Keller of Ohio State, Charles Casper of Texas

Christian and Glen Harkin of Louisiana State. John Lyman of Stanford and Jack Torrance of Louisiana State, in the shot putt. Both have exceeded the world's mark within the past month.

A high jump battle led by Duncan McNaughton and Van Osdel of the Trojan, exponent of the modified western roll; Willis Ward of Michigan, and others who have consistently jumped over six feet.

Two University of Oregon athletes will be here for the meet. They are Paul Starr, ace sprinter who one time set a world record which was disallowed because a breeze favored him, and Warren De Maria, javelin expert, who has held the Pacific Northwest record for several seasons.

Out of 89 players listed as recruits in the American League at the start of the 1932 season only nine have made the grade as regulars.

ation for a sales tax, or for any such tax as is proposed.

Holman said that while he believes Oregon is coming out of "the financial debacle," county and state economies in administration must be had.

The treasurer took a crack at the office of state budget director, held by Henry Hansen in his discussion of "governmental securities and duplications." "I cite as one of the many securities," he said, "the office of state budget director. With the exception of not to exceed possibly ninety days in every two years, this job is just about as necessary to the taxpayer as a plug hat to a farmer at a grange picnic."

Discussing the condition of the state treasury, Holman said Oregon's general road fund should be on a cash basis by the end of 1934, if anticipated revenues materialize.

A temperature of 109 degrees, the hottest day of the year, did not upset the program the grangers had scheduled, and drills, conferences and other convention work was carried on as usual.

Among the major resolutions adopted by the grange today were:

Closer affiliation of various farm organizations of the state; conservation of timber and scenic beauty at the entrance to Crater Lake park; that the grange work to have the action rescinded regarding the Spokane federal land bank not permitting many national farm associations to make loans to farmers in various districts. The grange feels this latter is not following the intent of the law.

The grange recommended that there be sufficient money in the state treasury to pay all claims for refunds on gasoline used in farm work when these claims are properly presented.

The inter-session banking committee of the grange recommended that senate bill 205, referring to formation of a state bank for Oregon, be submitted to the people in the general election of 1934.

The state bank bill proposed the creation and operation by the state of Oregon of a bank, with the provision the issue be referred to the voters. The senate killed the measure by indefinite postponement.

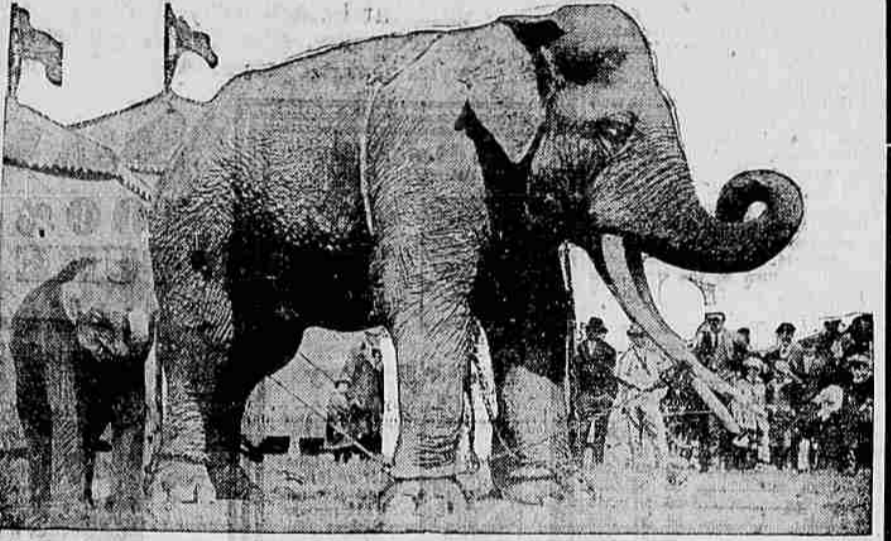
