CLEANING WOODWORK
To clean kitchen walls and woodwork thinly coated by grease from stove fumes, use a gallon of warm soap suds to which a tablespoon of kerosene has been added. Wash a small space at a time and then rinse with warm water and wipe dry at once. A sponge of soft cloth is suggested to use for washing and a soft lintless cloth for wiping. If the housewife goes over the kitchen once a month in this way, she will save much time, as the dirt is easily removed.

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
