

Capture Large Still At Head Of Prairie Creek

ENTERPRISE, Ore., July 15 (Special)—A large 80 gallon still was captured Tuesday afternoon on the head of Prairie creek by Sheriff A. B. Miller and Deputy John H. Hunsbarger. Sheriff Miller says he watched the men move the still from one place to another and then stepping out in the trail ordered "hands up." One immediately complied and the other jumped behind a log but was soon routed out.

The men, George Carlston and Emmett Balford, were brought to Enterprise and lodged in the county jail where formal complaints of having mosh in their possession and owning a still for the manufacture of moonshine whiskey were lodged Wednesday.

The still was of square box-like construction and made of heavy copper. It was well made and capable of producing a high grade liquor. Along with it cooler, coils and other paraphernalia were taken together with four full barrels of mosh and several empty ones. No finished product was taken.

HEAVY SELLING; PRICES TUMBLE

NEW YORK, June 15 (AP)—A broad rise in dollar exchange was accompanied by heavy selling of stocks today.

Leading shares tumbled \$1 to more than \$6 a share under a large volume of offerings in the last hour. Earlier, the market had been narrow and dull, but reports from London that an agreement was near on de facto stabilization of the dollar precipitated liquidation of speculative accounts. Approximately 4,000,000 shares changed hands.

The British pound sterling dropped more than 7 cents to a rate under \$4.06, which was around the level at which Wall Street heard stabilization might be effected.

The reaction in stocks was the sharpest thus far experienced in the so-called "bull market," which had rolled along for nearly two months without important interruption.

LaDieu Convicted Of Ballot Theft

MEDFORD, Ore., June 15 (AP)—J. Arthur LaDieu, former business associate of Llewellyn A. Banks, was convicted by a circuit court jury here last night of complicity in the theft and destruction last February of about 10,000 ballots which were stolen from the Jackson county courthouse vault. The jury deliberated seven hours.
LaDieu was business manager of Banks' newspaper. He, Banks and nearly 20 other persons were indicted in connection with the theft which occurred the night before a recount was to have been held.
Banks shot and killed a constable who tried to serve a warrant charging him with the ballot theft.

Fewer Accidents, But More Severe

SALEM, June 15 (AP)—Fewer but more disastrous automobile accidents were reported in May this year than last, the secretary of state announced today.
During May, 1,567 automobile accidents in Oregon brought death to 18 persons and injuries to 346 others. Last year 1,760 accidents in May resulted in 13 deaths and injuries to 402.
The year's total of automobile accidents reported up to the first of June was 7,509, injured persons, 1,396 and deaths 89, as compared to 9,188 accidents, 1,726 injured and 98 deaths over the same period last year.
