

RAINS AND HEAT SEND STREAMS UP

Streams Are Running High With Much Snow Yet in Mountains.

WALLOWA (Special)—Heavy rains and warm weather have caused a rapid melting of the deep snow in the high mountains during the past few days. Bear creek began rising the latter part of last week and on Saturday and Sunday had become extremely high. The lower wagon bridge west of town was said to be in danger of being washed out, with the water already going around one end of the bridge and nothing holding it except a cable which had been arranged to prevent its going out. The main Willows river has also been rising considerably and is about as high at this time as it usually reaches during the high water season. Some who have made trips there recently report vast amounts of snow in the higher mountains and that should the weather remain warm for the next week or two some exceptionally high waters are likely from the South Fork and Bear creek. Heavy irrigation is in progress from these streams and is helping some to take out water from the main channel and has a tendency to keep it down.

Alfalfa Benefits From The Heat

WALLOWA (Special)—The recent warm weather is proving very beneficial to alfalfa crops of this section. During much of the spring alfalfa made a very slow growth and generally died out in a short time. However, since the weather has become warmer it is growing nicely and many of the fields give indication of nearly normal first crops. Should growing conditions remain favorable it is likely that considerable cutting of the first crops will be done before July 4.

WALLOWA (Special)—Farmers are having excellent success getting large numbers of ground squirrels with poisoned oats. Following the cool, showery weather of last week the rodents are eating the poisoned bait quite readily. In some places some damage to grain crops have occurred from heavy cutting by the squirrels, but with rains coming at this time, serious damage to the crop is not expected, as the most of it will grow up again and not be far behind the other grain. Some of the larger farmers in the Leap and Parson creek districts report they have used as much as 1000 pounds of poisoned grain on their farms since early spring.
