TRICK ROPING IS EASY FOR CLANCY (Continued from Page One)

Until he was 14 years old, the young trick rider attended school but responding to the lure of the rope and the saddle, he left school books behind him and joined the group of showmen who travel the country performing in rodeos. His first show was at St. Joseph, Mo., where he performed all sorts of tricky antics with a rope and rode in the Roman standing races.

Much of his police in trick roping and riding, a great deal of which is required in the "silk saddle" stand, was acquired in the Roman standing races in which each rider rides standing on two horses.

Just before coming to La Grande Mr. Clancy appeared in shows in New York, Connecticut, Pennsylvania and other eastern cities. He also appeared in shows in Florida during the real estate boom under the auspices of the Elks. For amusement on Sundays and in the evenings he and the other men at the McCall ranch spend the time roping jack rabbits and practicing with the ropes and the horse.

One of his most difficult tricks is that of roping a running horse with a lasso which he manipulates with his foot. He rarely ever misses, even when he ropes two horses running side by side.

Among his most intricate rope tricks are the butterfly, the snipper-dip and the forming of flat loops of all sizes which he twists about his body and head, and jump-in and jump-out loops. On horses untrained for trick riding at the McCall ranch, Mr. Clancy displays daring in performing hazardous shoulder stands, double vaults, figure four vaults, twisting under the neck and the body of the horse, curling himself around the saddle, and completing the western roll-over.

He plans to remain at the McCall ranch until late in June when he will go to Idaho to appear in a celebration on July 2, 3 and 4 under the management of Bill Riley. He is expected to appear in several exhibitions in La Grande before leaving, however.
