of the bill is to tax gross sales of tangible personal property and personal service with exemptions; replacing state taxes, tangible personal property taxes; reducing county and municipal property taxes.

The soldiers and sailors bonus amendment, which will also come before the people, provides that no cash bonuses shall be paid by the state after the adoption of the amendment, and that no bonus loans shall be made by the state after June 30, 1938; authorizing the issuance of refunding bonds to refund bonds issued to provide funds from which to pay bonuses and make loans, the total of such original and refunding bonds outstanding at any time not to exceed the constitutional limitation now existing.

County Government
The constitutional amendment, referred to the people by the legislative assembly, concerning the county manager form of government will also appear on the ballot. The purpose of the bill is to authorize the county voters to adopt manager form of county government; abolish the present elective county offices except the school superintendent; and the circuit court discharging county judges' judicial duties.

The prosecution by information and grand jury modification amendment which will be put before the voters authorizes the enactment of a law providing for prosecuting public offenses by information of the district attorney instead of indictment as heretofore, and for modifying the grand jury system.

To require the approval of two-thirds of all electors for municipal corporations to issue bonds with certain exceptions and providing for legislative limitations on their power of taxation and indebtedness is the purpose of the debt and taxation limitations for municipal corporations constitutional amendment, also appearing on the ballot.

The people of the state of Oregon will also decide the question of whether a state general obligation 5 percent bonds totaling \$103,770.45 be issued and sold to provide money for the state power fund.

The oleomargarine tax bill provides for taxing the sale of oleomargarine four cents per pound; distributing the proceeds to the counties for indigent relief; requiring \$5 annual license fee for selling or distributing it.

Power Bill
The state grant bill is also creating an interest among the voters. The bill provides for the state to acquire and develop water power and hydroelectric energy, either separately or jointly with the United States or other states, and to sell at cost. All such property will be exempt from taxation, an elective bipartisan commission of three members for managing such business will be named and the present hydroelectric commission abolished. Bonds constituting general state obligations may be issued for financing such business when voted by the people.

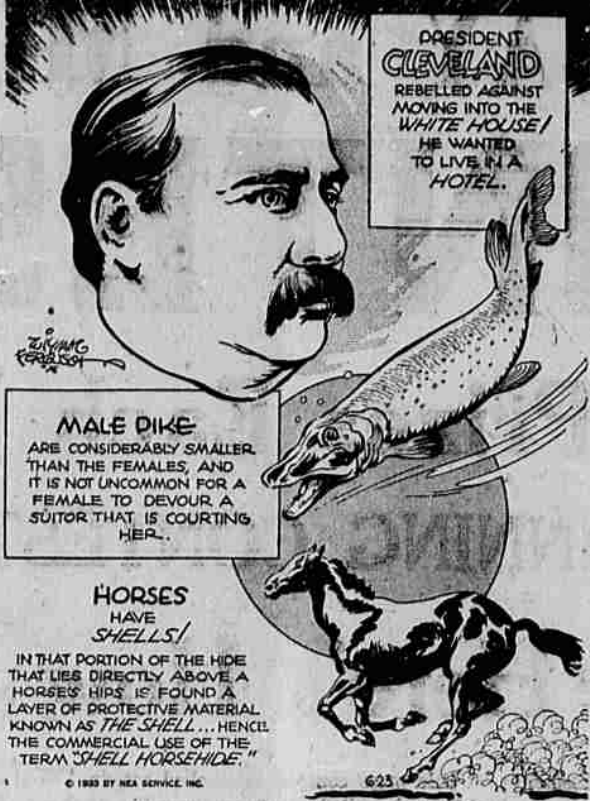

BONTHON FACES PAIR OF ACE IN COLLEGIATE MET

Fritz Crisler, who has made good in one short, successful school year at Princeton as athletic director, is bringing his track ace westward to run in what appears to be a very tough spot.

Crisler, who did his own starring at the University of Chicago and his apprentice coaching at the same place under Amos Alonzo Stagg, has entered Bill Bonthron, Princeton's double winner in the I. C. 4-A games, in the National Collegiate A. A. battle at Soldier field here June 10-17.

Hornbostel or Cunningham?
Bonthron, equally adept at the half-mile and mile, will find two of the nation's best bats, both westerners, "surrounding" him when he tries to decide which event to enter.

In the half-mile all Bill will have to contend with is one Charles Hornbostel—and the only half-mile race the bespectacled Hooster ever has failed to win was last summer's Olympic final (800 meters), where he placed sixth. And he was a sophomore then.

If the Princeton pacemaker decides to concentrate on the mile, there undoubtedly he'll find Glenn Cunningham of Kansas U. ready to battle for the pole. Among Mr. Cunningham's various accomplishments are a 4:11.1 mile, which happens to be the fastest outdoor mile ever officially clocked in this country!

Takes Some Flouting
But Bonthron's case is by no means hopeless. His mark of 1:53.5 in the I. C. 4-A 800 meters (just 5.12 yards short of 880 yards) is exactly the same as Hornbostel's record for the N. C. A. A. half-mile.

And some rather deep mathematics show that Bonthron traveled his winning 1,506 meters race at a speed which would have produced a 4:11.05 mile. He may not be able to run a full mile at the same speed he showed for 1,500 meters (1,940 yards), but if he should, that would make Cunningham stretch his legs.

committee to report next week. The navy department, pushing its extensive ship construction plans, sought arrangements to have the 30-hour work week applied to all its shipyard contracts. The requirement probably will be written into the call for bids on the half of the 32-essel program which will go to private builders. Similar regulation will control the construction in navy yards.

With the work program and industrial and farm price-lifting pushing forward fast as possible, the reconstruction corporation yesterday gave congress a report for May showing a peak in that month for its relief allocations. They totaled around \$500,000,000, including \$300,000,000 to the new federal farm credit agency for refinancing farm mortgages, while \$5,050,000 went to increase federal subscriptions to the capital stock of the federal home loan bank.

NEST OF LAUGHING GULLS FOUND IN SOUTH CAROLINA
CHARLESTON, S. C. (AP) — The laughing gull, which has laughed at South Carolina naturalists who sought his homestead for several years, has been found out.

E. Milby Burton, director of the Charleston museum, reports that the first nest of this bird, a variety long suspected of breeding on the nearby coast, has been discovered. Burton and a group of others interested found a nest of the laughing gull recently, and observed it for two or three hours.

CHIEF TRIES MILITARY DRILL TO BALANCE RED TEACHING
SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Military and civic training in all schools has been instituted by Chile in its campaign against communism.

Several hundred teachers recently were dismissed when it was proven that they either were members of communist "cells" or had taught communistic ideas.

Domingo Duran, minister of education, and Emilio Bello, minister of defense, drew up the new courses. All pupils are to be given military training, starting from the first grade and continuing through the university.

ANCIENT EGYPTIAN BUDGET REVEALED BY TOMB RECORD

CAIRO (AP) — The tomb of the controller of finances of Pharaoh Khufu, builder of the second pyramid about 3,000 B. C., has been found by Professor Selim Hassan near the fourth pyramid.

Inscriptions on the walls revealed that the Egyptian budget of this period totalled about \$10,000,000.

The tomb was 15 feet below the surface. On top of a large sarcophagus in the burial chamber was a small casket containing face powder with a large scarab on one side and an alabaster head-rest on the other.

Besides the sarcophagus was a small offering-table, holding numerous daggers and pieces of pottery.

The mummy was in a poor state of preservation. A heavy gold bracelet was on the left wrist, a massive gold circle on the left ankle and a string of semi-precious stones around the neck.

IN LAST ACT
Lord Nelson's Great-Niece Plays In British Film

LONDON (AP) — Lord Nelson's great-niece, said to be the oldest actress in England, is playing in a film here.

Aged 90, this descendant of Britain's sea hero is Horatia Nelson, who has played 250 parts and has reared eight children.

"I'd have worn better if I hadn't had to keep them through two wars on nothing," she said.

"I remember only one time when film work got me a bit dizzy. That was when I had to smoke a pipeful of strong tobacco for two hours."
