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LEADING STOCKS CONTINUE GAINS

NEW YORK, June 26 (AP)—Security markets generally trailed a runaway grain market today with several leading stocks reaching new high levels for the past year or more with gains ranging from 1 to 7 points.

The so-called farm equities, along with the alcohol issues, were the fastest movers. Although stocks were steady to firm early, spurring wheat and cotton prices brought a rush of buyers.

Cotton was whirled up about \$4 a bale. The American dollar apparently was not a motivating influence, as it improved moderately in terms of some leading foreign exchanges.
