IMBLER HI HAS A STRONG DEPT.

Smith-Hughes Work Does Practical Work, Builds Smith-Hughes Dept. Does

IMBLER (Special) — During the past year at the Imbler high school vocational agricultural dept. 40 days were devoted to farm shop. Instruction was on a job basis. Several boys would work in a unit on one type of shop work while a number in another unit would be working on a different job.

Shop instruction consisted of rope work, harness repair, soldering various kinds of metal, babbitting split and solid bearings, window repair, tool sharpening and saw filing, painting and wood finishing, forge work, cold metal work and wood work.

Some of the major shop jobs consisted of making grain sack holders, livestock feeders, library tables, utility benches, ironing boards and book cases. Minor projects were making switches, forge tools, window repair, soldering holes in buckets, making small articles such as paint boxes, small tables, repairing parts of harness and making and repairing tools.

A complete inventory of the Smith-Hughes agricultural equipment shows a valuation of \$1099.90. This is considerably higher than the inventory last year. Several hundred new bulletins were secured from various experiment stations and equipment for fairs and exhibits was obtained from fair premiums.
