

### Local Chamber Of Commerce To Issue Permits

The La Grande chamber of commerce has been authorized by the national forest officials to issue fire permits for the Umatilla, Wallowa and Whitman national forests, and is the only place in Northeastern Oregon where permits can be obtained for all three. Anyone going into the national forest with the intention of camping must obtain a fire permit and the chamber of commerce is authorized to issue them as an added service with no charge.

Anyone planning a trip over the Fourth of July must be equipped with: one ax, not less than 26 inches in length over-all with the head weighing two pounds or over; one shovel, not less than 36 inches in length all over, with blade not less than eight inches wide; and one water container with a capacity of one gallon or more. A fire permit also is necessary and H. C. Boone, secretary of the chamber, states that those planning a trip must secure fire permits on Saturday since the office will not be open on Monday, July 3. Violation of the requirements are punishable by fine or imprisonment or both.

### ALLOCATION OF ROAD SUM CONSIDERED

The California boundary, \$1,290,975, or 19.4 per cent will be set aside.

East of the Cascades to a line north and south from Blalock, \$808,000 or 14.2 per cent is being allocated, and from Blalock east to the Idaho line, \$1,039,000 will be spent.

Additional \$400,000

An additional \$400,000 will be distributed east of the Cascades under terms of the Cotton-Oudin law providing for highway construction through public lands. It is believed this money will be applied to the Central Oregon highway between Juntura and Burns, the I-O-N cut off north of McDermott, and to a road in the Warm Springs Indian reservation.

The regulations governing administration of the federal money require that 25 per cent must be spent in municipalities, and 25 per cent on secondary roads. It is believed that on such secondary highways, the commission may devote most of the money to construction of new bridges.

The commission had decided, also, to re-advertise for bids on the Aurora-Brooks and the Canby sections of the Pacific highway after rejecting all bids for this construction work yesterday on the basis that proposals were too high.

must rise," he said. "He will, if necessary, resort to the extraordinary powers which congress gave him to put his program into effect. And the big point in his drive is to get prices back up where there is cost and a reasonable profit to be made out of a commodity."

Pierce is "sold," he said, on the president's determination to put men back to work. He believes that if the world economic conference at London does not meet with success that the president will swing into a program which will impel the United States to take care of itself and trade with other nations as it sees fit rather than in the "much-talked-of cooperative spirit."

"I regret one thing that has come in the Roosevelt program," the former governor said, "and that is branch banking. I am gratified that the feature guaranteeing bank deposits is included in the new banking legislation, but I don't like branch banking."

### KEEPING COLOR IN COTTONS

COLORFUL cottons will not fade or run if proper precautions in washing are taken. Avoid hard rubbing, boiling and harsh soaps. For Best Results

1. Make tepid or cool suds using mild, pure, white soap or flakes. Home-made soap is too unreliable for safe use. A little borax will soften very hard water.
2. Wash only one article at a time, especially when washing new materials. Later, if entirely fast, they may be washed with other colors.
3. Put into suds and wash by hand or machine. Rub badly soiled places gently between hands or on board, using a cake of pure soap if necessary. In a washing machine, run colored cottons separately in lukewarm suds.
4. Use three lukewarm rinsing waters. Starch, if desired, should be very thin, cool, boiled starch. Dry in shade.
5. Lightweight cottons, such as voiles, may be rolled up and squeezed in a towel until almost dry and then pressed immediately.
