

Butter Demand Strengthening In Oregon Mart

PORTLAND, June 29 (AP)—Demand for butter continued to strengthen here with further decrease in exporting operations. While there was no additional advance noted in the price either on the open market or on the produce exchange, the general trade was at full values.

Butterfat values have not been changed here for an extended period, even when the market for butter reflected a slightly easier undertone with manipulation, reported by outside distributors.

Market for eggs was showing a generally steady tone locally but without price changes. Receipts were decreasing.

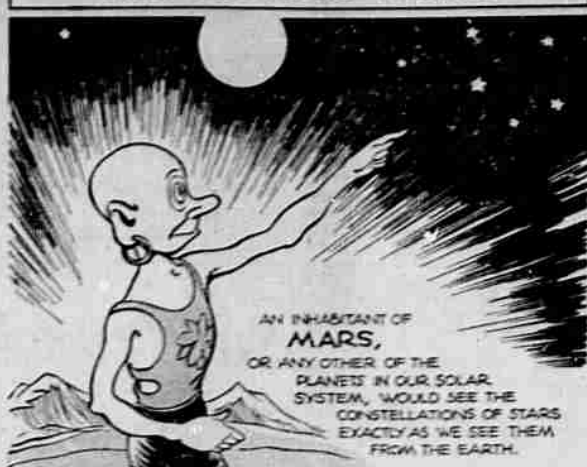
Strawberries were increasing in the market for live chickens but without price changes for the day. There was another advance in the price of strawberries here, the result of decreasing offerings and an apparent awakening of consumers to this fact. Raspberries and currants were a trifle lower.

World Carryover Of Wheat July 1 Likely To Be Big

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The bureau of agricultural economics said today the world carryover of wheat in the principal exporting countries as of July 1 is expected to be as much as 50,000,000 bushels above that of last year.

In an official statement, it said the United States crop of wheat this year now appears to be less than domestic needs but because of the carry-over of old wheat, supplies for the 1933-34 season, including carry-over and new crop will probably provide a surplus for export.

NEW YORK, June 29 (AP)—Stocks moved rather cautiously today in the face of new currency stabilization activities at London and a consequential rally of the dollar in foreign exchange markets.
