SALT LAKE CITY, June 30 (AP)—Daniel S. Spencer, who began his railroad career as a call boy in 1874, will retire Saturday as general passenger agent of the Union Pacific system, after 59 years of continuous service with the system and its predecessor companies.

Announcement of Spencer's retirement was made by H. J. Plunhof, general manager of the Oregon short line unit. He will be succeeded by E. A. Klippel Jr., general agent, passenger department, formerly of Portland, Ore., Plunhof said.
