of lives in its annual celebration of its independence than it did in the initial skirmishes of the revolution. It was revealed by a survey which showed, however, a sharp decrease in fireworks fatalities.

A total of at least 185 men, women and children perished during the holiday, compared with the total loss of 7 men at Lexington and 92 at Concord back in April of 1775 when the forces of the original colonies clashed with those of King George III.

In addition there were hundreds of cases of injured.


