Shortly after arriving here he entered the stock business and built steadily until, at the time of his death, he was known as one of the largest holders of livestock in Wallowa county.

earnings was incomplete, but there were indications that pay envelopes were considerably heavier, probably better filled than in any month since May last year. The increases in May and April resulted from increased hours of work, the board's figures showed, and not from increases in wage rates, which declined slightly in May to about 45.4 cents per hour. Some financial observers expected June figures to show increases in wage rates as well as hours worked. The American Federation of Labor estimated that between 1,600,000 and 2,000,000 men were returned to work in April, May and June.
