and replacing it with modern and larger steel pipe, of sufficient size to insure a daily flow to La Grande of a maximum of 4,000,000 gallons of water — more than enough for the city's present domestic needs. Retirement of the 70 per cent of the bonds would come from water receipts and the issue would in no way be a burden on the shoulders of the taxpayers. In other words, no taxes would be used to repay the cost of the project. The same judges and clerks named

by the county for the La Grande precincts would be selected by the city, thus reducing the cost of the election to a minimum.

The question as it appears on the ballot, will give the purpose of the vote in brief form and then will follow: Bonds, yes; Bonds, no — a simple form that no voter can become confused on.
