Clinton Hamblen and family arrived Saturday from Ontario. Mr. Hamblen will have charge of the shop at the McChubbly service station.

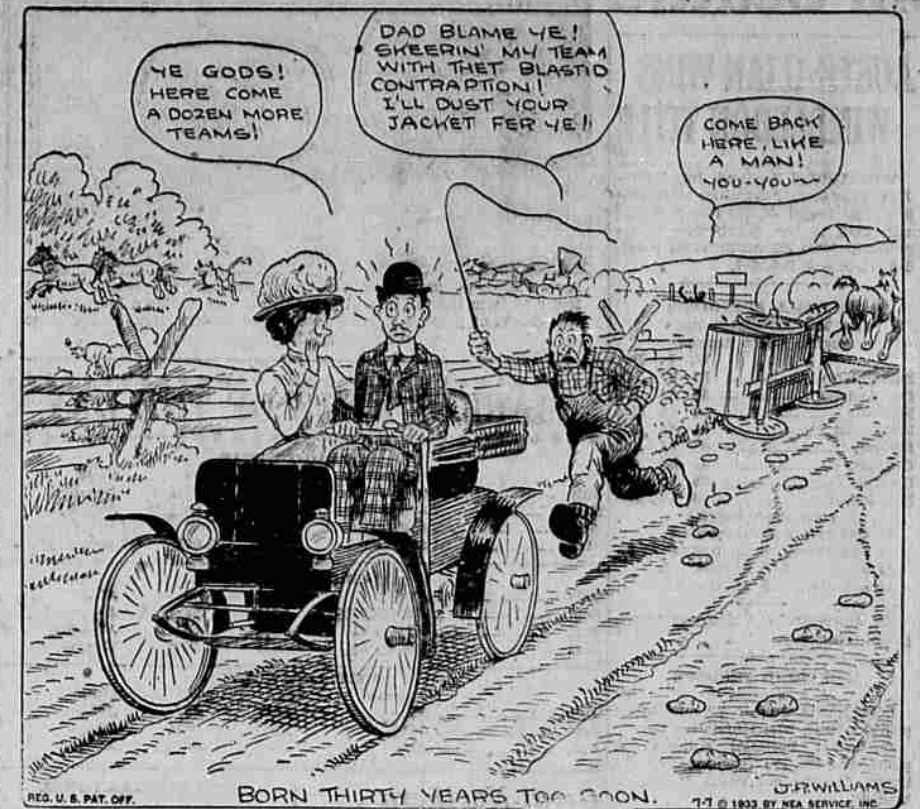
Mrs. Hilda Haines is making a splendid recovery from her recent operation. Mrs. Haines is at the home of her mother, Mrs. S. E. Magness.

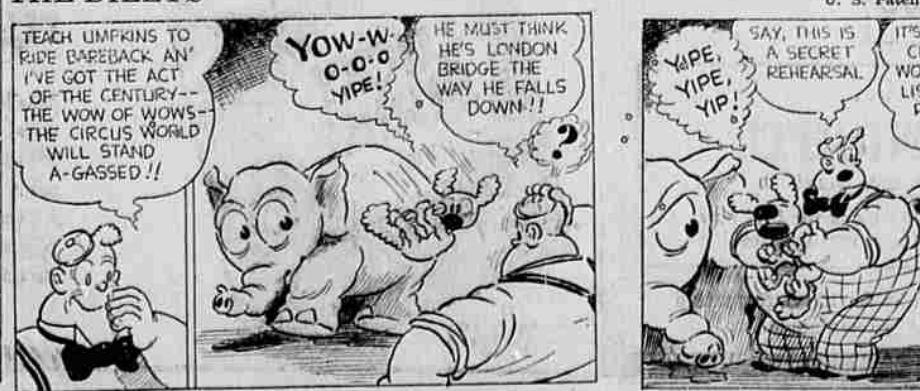
