AMERICAN TRIP

OSLO (49) - A royal but democratic couple, Crown Prince Olav and Princess Martha, of Norway, will visit the United States in September.

As representatives of King Haakon VII, they will spend about six weeks in America, traveling from New York to Washington, D. C., thence to Chicago, and perhaps out to the west coast if time permits.

Crown Prince Olav, who has a fine herd of blooded cows and a truck garden at his country estate, may be particularly interested in studying American farming.

The crown prince has been an idol of the Norwegian nation ever since he arrived in Oslo at the age of two, sitting on the arm of his father who had been called to the throne from Denmark.

Princess Martha, to whom he was married in March, 1929, is a Swedish cousin and their union was hailed in both countries as a real love match.

They have two daughters, Princess Ragnhild, who was born in 1930, and the year-old Princess Astrid.

The plainness of their domestic life and the democracy of their ways have entrenched them solidly in Scandinavian hearts. They have no court, the crown prince merely having a military aide and the princess a lady-in-waiting.

Their home is only a 40-minute ride out of Oslo and there Grandpa Hanko and Grandma Maude frequently go to visit Princess Ragnhild and Princess Astrid. Occasionally, too, Grandpa Charles and Grandma Ingeborg come over the border from Sweden.

Among the ceremonies which the royal couple will attend in the United States will be the laying of the cornerstone of the Leif Ericson memorial in Chicago.

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP) - Railroad executives have been informed by Joseph B. Eastman, coordinator of transportation, that the Roosevelt administration believes many of their salaries should be reduced.

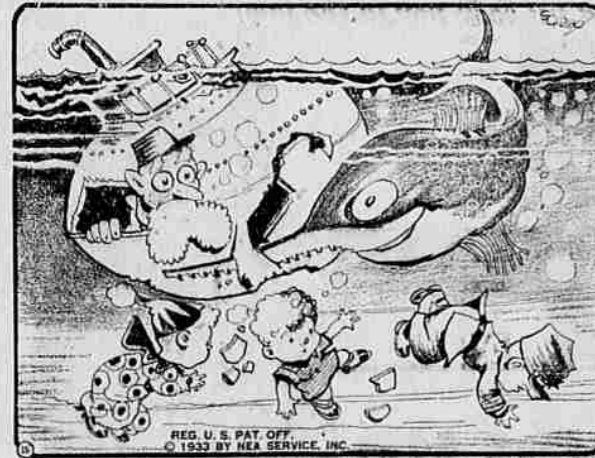
The statement opened a conference with regional coordinators groups elected by the carriers to co-operate with Eastman.

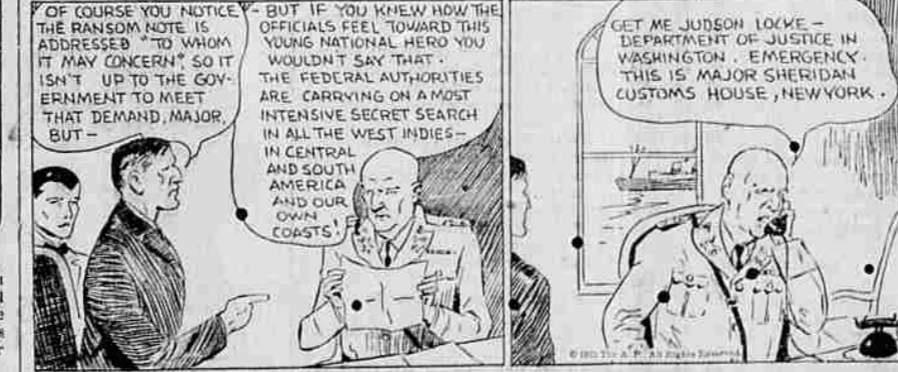

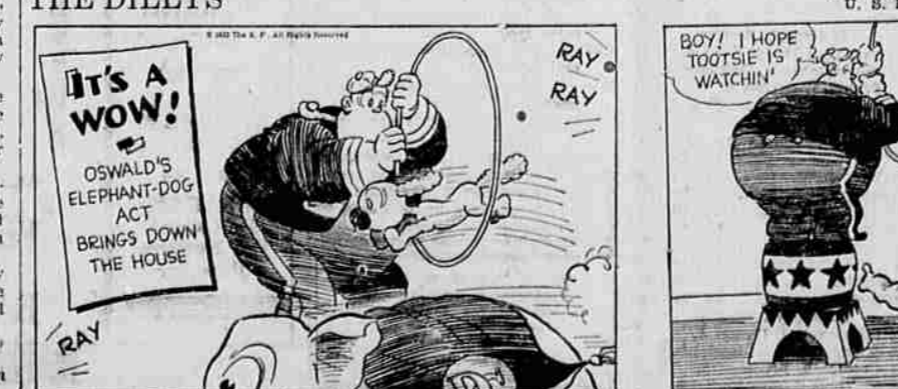
