Frisco Fielder Breaks Record With 50th Hit

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15 (AP)—Just a kid, Joe Demaggio, 18-year-old San Francisco Seals outfielder, whose proud dad pilots a fishing boat, today had shattered a Pacific coast league batting record which was established the year he was born.

"Deadpan Joe," so-called because his face is expressionless as he rifles baseballs to all corners of the lot, last night hit safely in his 50th consecutive game.

Way back in 1915, Jack Neas, Oakland first baseman, ran his consecutive games hitting streak to 49 and for 18 years such stars as Paul Waner, Earl Averill, Tony Lazzeri and other swatters have failed to break the record.

And in those days they didn't have night baseball to contend with and the ball parks were much smaller. A trick of fate tossed young Demaggio into professional baseball. He had played on the sandlots and when the Seals training camp opened last spring his older brother, Vince, brought him around and pleaded with the team owners to give the kid a chance.

They did and Joe ousted Vince from the Seals lineup. New World Record Made By Swimmer
