ACTUAL COST TUITION WILL BE FOLLOWED

The directors of school district No. 1 met last night to authorize the clerk to sign a contract with the non-high school board for tuition for pupils from surrounding districts which do not have high schools. The contract, the same as those for all high school districts of the county, provides that the high school district receive actual cost, same to be figured as found by computation at the end of the school year from the district's records. Last year, the cost per high school pupil in the La Grande district was about 57 cents per day, and this varied in the several districts from 51 to 75 cents. One-half payment will be made in January and the balance next July.
