Deny Rehearings Today in Mannix, DeGrace Trials

SALEM, July 25 (AP)—Petitions for rehearings in the cases of Thomas B. Mannix against the Portland Telegram and the state against C. A. DeGrace were denied by the Oregon supreme court here today in oral opinions. No comments were made in handing down these opinions.

Mannix won judgment against the Portland Telegram for \$32,500 in a suit for libel. The supreme court affirmed the judgment in a previous opinion.

DeGrace, formerly president of the Prudential Savings and Loan group, was sentenced to four years in the state penitentiary and fined \$1,000 on charges of devising a scheme to defraud.

FARM WAGE GAIN HELD NECESSARY FOR U. S. RECOVERY

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25 (AP)—A declaration that an increase of agricultural wages must quickly follow increases in particular commodity prices was expressed by the Oregon co-operative council in a special meeting here Monday.

The council, representing producers of Oregon in many varied lines, met here to discuss details and development of the new federal system of farm financing and to consider trade agreements and fair practices codes under provisions of the national industry recovery act.

About 30 co-operative managers and producers, representing dairying, wool, nut packers, fruit-growers, turkey raisers and similar industries, attended the meeting and endorsed three resolutions.

The co-operative council declared the greatly desired increase in the price of agricultural commodities cannot be expected upon a sound and lasting basis unless fair wages and fair hours are properly effected in agricultural pursuits, inasmuch as a large portion of the purchasing power of the country at large comes from agricultural labor. The resolution stated that while giving the national administrative program hearty support, the council urges that agricultural labor wages must be increased to correspond with the increases in commodity prices.

Another resolution urged that the administering heads of the several departments of the new farm credit and financing units be selected only on the basis of ability and not from the standpoint of political service. A third resolution was a protest against the recent discontinuance of the federal leased wire system through which market information was dispensed to dealers and producers.

Pecora Quizzes Stock Exchange President Today

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—Ferdinand Pecora, counsel for the senate stock market investigating committee, wired Senator Steiwer (R., Ore.), today that President Whitney of the New York stock exchange, "Denies knowledge of any pool or any other artificial manipulation having contributed to market movement in recent days."

After asking Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel, to determine causes of the recent stock slump, Steiwer proposed that business leaders and economists study three propositions for consideration next session. They were:

"Preparation of a simplified form of corporate returns to be used by all corporations, reporting to the treasury, so that the reader could tell approximately the liquidating value of all classes of securities in any corporation at the time the return was made."

"An adequate curb on short-selling."

"A prohibition of the directors of any corporation increasing, decreasing or suspending the payment of dividends without first securing from the stockholders a 60-day prior authorization."
