## PETER JACKSON WINS IN FOURTH ROUND OF FIGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26 (AP) — The powerful punches of young Peter Jackson, Los Angeles negro, were too much for Ah Wing Lee, Portland Chinese, and Jackson was awarded a technical knockout over the Portlander in the fourth of 10 scheduled rounds in the main event of last night's fight card here. Each weighed 134.

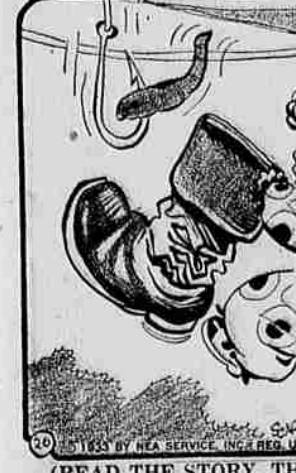
From the opening song Jackson showed his superiority, and the Chinese fighter apparently never had a chance. Jackson knocked Lee down in the second round, then sent him to the canvas three times in the third, twice for the count of nine. When a steaming blow sent Lee to the canvas again in the fourth round, Referee Tom Loutitt, without waiting to count, stepped in and stopped the one-sided battle.

The largest crowd, officially counted at 15,000, since the one that saw the Jack Dempsey exhibition here three years ago, witnessed the struggle, held in the open air at the civic stadium. The gate was more than \$11,000. The fans, expecting Lee would fight Jackson at least on fairly even terms, apparently were so surprised by the swift finish that they sat silently until Lee had recovered, then cheered the flashing fighter from the south.

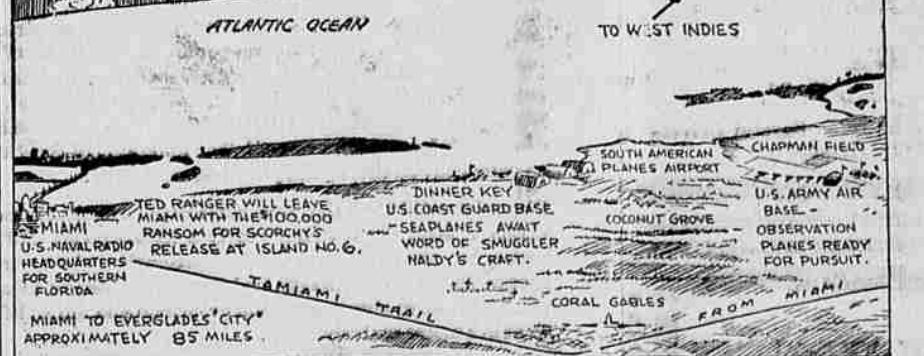
