Visiting—Miss Ona Hudson, who teaches at Bend, and Miss Pansy Van Housen.

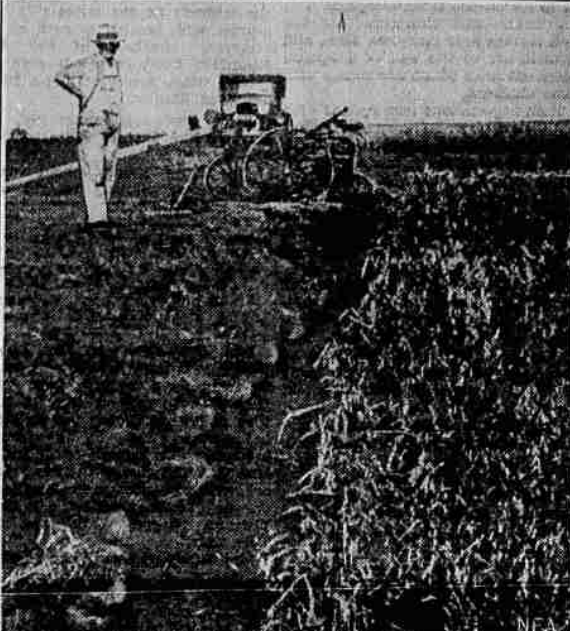
