

REPORTS HEAVY SALE OF BUTTER

PORTLAND, July 31 (AP) — There was heavy sale of butter over the weekend and floor stocks of jobbers and churners were getting well cleaned up.

Indications that the market is not as weak as suggested by the recent tactics of outside interests was that butterfat values were occasionally shown with a premium of 1/2 to 1c lb. and especially so for sweet, which was scarce.

Woman Diplomat Seeking Trade With Denmark

COPENHAGEN (AP) — Personally popular with the Danes, Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, the new American envoy here, has also endeavored herself to the American community.

"I am a business woman and I came here to assist in restoring the normal flow of trade between America and Denmark. That is my principal business."

She has set about that business with zest. She is negotiating not only through the Danish foreign office but keeps in touch with other cabinet ministers and with the Danish captains of industry and commerce.

Shortly, Mrs. Owen expects to be able to talk to them in Danish. She is studying the language intensively though she is at work in the legation office from early morning till late in the afternoon daily.

Upon the American community here she has impressed the idea that they are to consider her house their American home in Denmark.

When Mrs. Owen was in Denmark two years ago, she and her children motored through the country and she had many invitations to revisit scenes of that trip.

CLOSE HEAVY IN STOCK EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, July 31 (AP) — Stock market prices slumped today under quiet but steady liquidation and some renewed short selling by bearish contingents that played for the expected "secondary reaction."
