## RETAIL CODE FINAL DRAFT BEING DRAWN

Later, however, A. D. Whiteside, a deputy administrator, said it had not been determined whether this would affect all stores or only those in the smaller cities. These smaller stores have contended since they are now working some 60 to 80 hours, cutting to 40 would be financially impossible. Hugh S. Johnson, chief administrator, said the plan to permit the retailers to operate temporarily under their own code and use the official "blue eagle" insignia was not an exemption from the president's agreement, but was fulfilling the intent of the agreement to speed up submission of codes. Johnson emphasized there would be no big group exemption of any kind.

## Expert Anglers Puzzled, But It's All Clear Now

ASTORIA, Ore., July 31 (AP) — Expert anglers who are accustomed to get results when they whip their lines into river pools, were puzzled all this month by a very definite lack of reward on the Necanicum river one of the best fishing streams in the state.

Saturday state policemen solved the puzzle. Louis Glana of Seaside, and Hans Kaufman of Portland, were arrested when police discovered they had installed two chicken wire fish traps across the stream, completely barring the river about three miles south of Seaside.

## PRUNE MARKETING CODE DRAFTED AT SATURDAY MEETING

A code to regulate the marketing of fresh prunes was drafted at a meeting of shippers of Southern Idaho and the Walla Walla and Yakima valleys here on Saturday. The code will be presented to a full meeting of shippers soon and when approved it will be sent to Washington, D. C., for approval. Continuing ethics and practices to be followed, the code must be endorsed by a majority of factors interested in the prune deal before it can be adopted.

It was brought out that a survey of the Walla Walla valley by the federal inspection service had shown a production this year of only 720 carloads as against a normal crop of 1200 to 1400 carloads. The 720 figure is about 60 per cent of normal. Last year's production was 1200 cars, of which only about 800 were shipped.

Shippers at the meeting included L. D. Felch, Ewing Stephens, R. D. Monahan and Frank Lamb of the Walla Walla-Milton Freewater division; George Hodgins and George Preas, representing an advisory committee of shippers from Walla Walla, and representatives from Yakima and Idaho.

Johnson explained to newspapermen he was dissatisfied with the wage and hours provisions of the retail code as submitted last night, and had ordered it rewritten. This was the process being undertaken today. "I haven't seen what they have done today but I am not going to approve it unless I am satisfied," he said.

The "company union," perennial source of conflict between organized labor and the great steel makers, was eliminated today from the code proposed by that industry at the insistence of Johnson, but the manufacturers served emphatic notice they will make every effort to continue this method of dealing with their employees.
