GIVES REPORT ON ACCOMPLISHMENTS AT E. L. INSTITUTE

First complete report of the activities at the Epworth League institute at Wallows Lake camp grounds July 17-23 was issued today.

Another delightful and profitable institute was observed, the statement said. The registration of 226 leaguers and 293 folk on the grounds for the entire week was one of the largest in point of attendance at this most beautiful mountain lakeside.

The closing Sunday crowd was probably well above 500. Twenty-three pastoral charges were represented with splendid delegations. Nampa, Idaho had the largest group coming the most miles with 32 delegates and 36 in camp coming 260 miles. Twelve classes beside the morning watch and the evening service were provided, each led by an earnest vibrant worker with youth.

The caliber and effectiveness of the faculty members is indicated in the fact that 194 students received certificates.

There were 17 pastors on the grounds with their young folk. The absence of Rev. A. B. Parrett, of Caldwell, due to an appendectomy, was regretted by all. The institute was grateful for the news that his recovery was progressing under the skillful nursing of Mrs. Parrett.

Due to Mr. Parrett's illness and Dr. Andrew Warner being unable to be there the management was very fortunate in securing Dr. J. Edgar Purdy and Rev. H. L. Allen as faculty substitutes. Both these men made a fine contribution to the institute and endeared themselves to the young folk.

Rev. C. O. Heath for four years dean of the institute brought the Sunday morning sermon which gripped young and old alike.
