

### Now Is The Time For Buying Of New Furniture

Right now is the time to buy furniture, according to J. Ed Fitzgerald who has just returned from Portland where he visited the Doernbecker, Johns and Simons manufacturing houses as well as several furniture dealers. Furniture stores now have pieces bought at wholesale prices considerably below those now being charged by manufacturers and after their present stock is exhausted prices will be forced to rise.

Mr. Fitzgerald finds that the wholesale price of furniture has risen from 30 to 50 per cent. Many of the items used in the manufacture, such as mohair and cotton, have been lower than other products, and are now assuming not only their normal price but also an additional gain caused by the current rise in all commodity prices. Factories have been operating at a loss in order to keep running and for that fact the rise in many of the furniture prices is higher than other products.

Furniture factories now do not guarantee the wholesale price to furniture dealers but new orders will be priced according to the price current at time of shipment.
