

ROY SKEEN WINS TENNIS TOURNAMENT AT EAST NORMAL

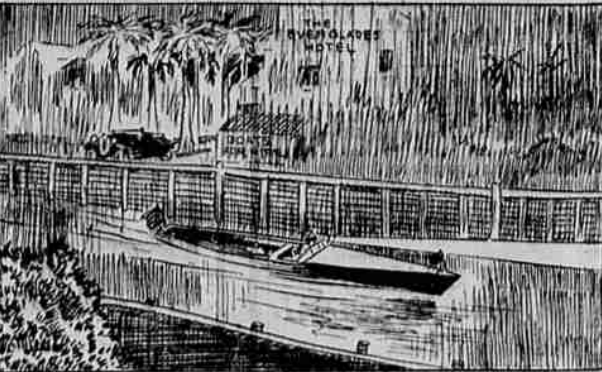

Pounding three Seattle pitchers for 21 hits, Hollywood outslugged the Indians, 14-12, to even the series.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 3 (AP)—Finals of the American Legion's annual junior baseball world's series will be held this year at New Orleans, La., Sept. 1, 2 and 3. It was announced here.

Winners of the eastern sectional tournament, to be played at Springfield, O., Aug. 22, 23 and 24, and at the western at Topeka, Kan., Aug. 25, 26 and 27, will go to New Orleans for the finals.

The rain did no more than temporarily cool the air, and the minimum last night dropped no lower than 59 above. Unofficial thermometers showed a reading of 70 above

about 7:30 o'clock last night, several hours after rain first began falling.

This was one of the most severe electrical storms in the last two years, particularly in the number of times the lightning found a mark. The storm broke here after a partly cloudy day with the mercury climbing to 91 above.

EAST'S HEAT WAVE BROKEN
NEW YORK, Aug. 3 (AP)—A north-west wind stirring the air at 12 miles

an hour broke the east's 5 day heat oppression today and promised a stop to the toll of deaths that reached over a hundred.

The cooling breeze kept the mercury in New York's metropolitan area down in the 70s in the early hours of the forenoon and held the humidity in the 80s. The weather bureau expected the temperature to remain under 90 throughout the day and be carried downward by showers tonight.
