

Portland Prices On Eggs Highest Along the Coast

PORTLAND, Aug. 4 (AP) — Everywhere shaded prices were suggested in the market for eggs except perhaps for limited lots of extreme quality. Owing to the fact that Portland was today quoting the highest price along the coast, there was no shipping call whatever except where concessions were made.

Cold storage stock, selling as strictly fresh goods, keeps the volume of supplies rather liberal. Price cutting by some retailers, at times selling below actual cost, was a factor against the market.

First sweet potatoes of the season were here from California and they are of good quality. Initial offerings were priced 11c lb.

Trade in the butter market remained slow. Advertising of supplies by one big firm several cents under actual cost did not do the market much good.

First J. H. Hale peaches of the season were their appearance. They were of large size and initially priced \$1.40 box. Other peaches unchanged.

LAKEVIEW, Ohio (AP) — Capt. Charles Hunter, one of the best known lighthouse keepers on the Great Lakes, has retired from active duty and now has nothing to do but attend to the numerous hobbies developed during his 30 years' service.

Averill, insurance commissioner, despite repeated warnings from his office through the medium of the press cautioning the public to beware of strangers representing concerns of this class, these operatives still succeed in selling policies and collecting money.
