FEDERAL PROHIBITION AGENTS LET OUT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (AP) — All prohibition enforcement employees of the government today received official notification of dismissal effective at midnight tomorrow, under President Roosevelt's federal reorganization program abolishing the bureau.

John S. Hurley, expected to head the prohibition unit of the new division of investigation being established in the justice department, said the order applied to all of the 1800 employees.

Some 1200 will be reemployed immediately to work in the division of investigation, Hurley saying there would be "no material change" in enforcement activities.

Asked if the majority of administrators would be left off the rolls, Hurley replied "many" might be, and that "material changes will be made all along the line in the interests of efficiency."

The men took the statement good naturedly and there was every indication that each one would accept the emergency cut in the spirit in which it was made.

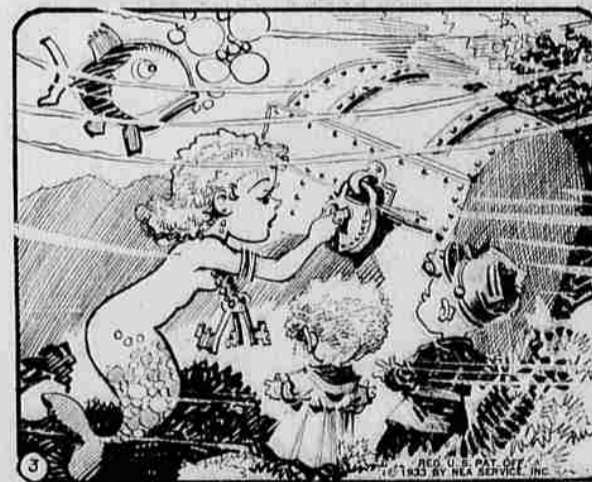
