

PROPOSED CODE IS SUBMITTED BY GRAIN EXCHANGES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (AP) — A proposed code of fair competition for the grain exchanges, submitted Wednesday to the farm adjustment administration, fixed definite minimum margins to be put up in virtually all speculative purchases of grain.

Other portions of the proposed code followed generally rules and regulations established since the recent drop in grain prices caused farm officials to ask the exchange officials to change the regulations.

Heretofore, however, the question of margin requirements on purchases has not been definitely fixed, the requirement being that the margin be "adequate."

The proposed code calls for regulation by the grain exchanges and the carrying into effect by their officials of the rules laid down.

The code sets the minimum margin for virtually all open future contracts for grain dealings should be ten per cent of the market price "on open contracts for 250,000 bushels or less" for any one customer.

The requirements for open contracts of over 250,000 but less than 2,000,000 bushels is ten per cent of the market price of the first 250,000 bushels and 15 per cent of the market price for the remainder.

Where more than 2,000,000 bushels are bought or sold, the margin on all over that figure is 20 per cent, under the code.

The exchanges agreed to continue present regulations which limit fluctuations for one day's trading to five cents per bushel on wheat, rye and barley, four cents per bushel on corn and three cents per bushel on oats.

The code is to go into effect after its approval by the president and the secretary of agriculture.

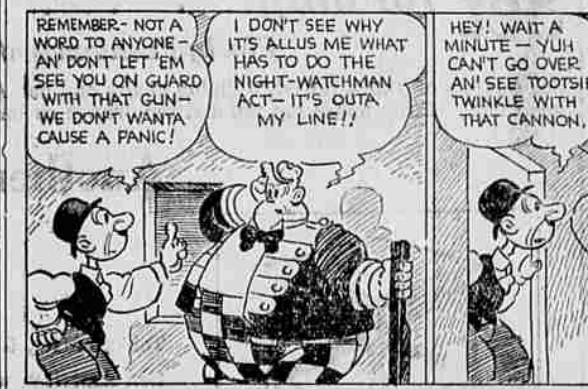

ASK TAX EXEMPTION SALEM, Aug. 10 (AP) — An initiative petition seeking an amendment to the state constitution to allow an exemption of \$1200 on taxable property, was filed with the secretary of state today. Signatures of 30,000 registered voters must be secured before July 5, 1934.

The petitions was filed by the Home Owners Tax Exemption League. The constitution of the state now does not allow any exemption on homes and property other than personal property.

The new law would become effective, if approved by the people in November of 1934, on January 1, 1935.
