YAKIMA USES PICK HANDLES ON AGITATORS

protection marked farm labor troubles which today were repeated threatening Pacific coast fruit and vegetable harvests. The pick handles were swung, along with clubs and pieces of gas pipe, as 150 ranchers and their employees drove away 40 assorted labor agitators from orchards near Yakima, Wash.

A. J. Elliott, supervisor of Tulare county, Cal., issued the request for the national guard after nearly all of 700 workers on the Tague peach ranch had joined a strike for shorter hours and higher wages.

At Oroville, Cal., Sheriff C. W. Toland said he would also ask for national guard aid if troubles near Chico in which five alleged agitators were arrested were repeated.

Officials of the California Packing corporation, whose two peach ranches at the height of the season, were affected, said the crop will go unharvested if the workers persist in their demands.

Strike leaders declared they were seeking an increase in pay from 17 1/2 cents to 30 cents an hour and a 40-hour work week.

A strike affecting 1000 Filipino lettuce field workers in the Salinas valley was called by P. H. Cronquist, president of the Philippine labor council, who declared beet field and sugar refinery workers were also prepared to join.

Obituary

REV. OLIVER RILEY, D. D. Rev. Oliver Riley, 55, dean of St. Andrew's Episcopal church in Scottsbluff, Neb., for the past four years after leaving La Grande where he was rector of St. Peter's church, who died in Denver, Colo., Thursday, July 21, received a fitting tribute in the Scottsbluff Star-Herald directly following his unexpected death.

"Although a Scottsbluff resident for a comparatively short time, Dean Riley had endeared himself with Scottsbluff people," the article states. "Not only has he taken an active part in local church and social affairs, but had been prominent in theological activities and in the work of other organizations throughout the territory. "He was president of the Scottsbluff area council, Boy Scouts of America, was the past state chaplain of the American Legion, the chaplain of the local legion post and the Elks lodge, was vice president of the Boy Scout committee of the state legion and a member of the committee of examining chaplains of the missionary district of western Nebraska. He was a Rotarian and Knight Templar. "He preached his first sermon in Scottsbluff on Palm Sunday, March 24, 1929, and evidence of his popularity as a rector is seen in the fact that the communicant list of his church grew from 50 to more than 300 in slightly more than four years. "While in La Grande Dean Riley was not only a popular rector but also was prominent in Boy Scout and civic activities.
