No Processing Tax On Hogs Due Before First Of October

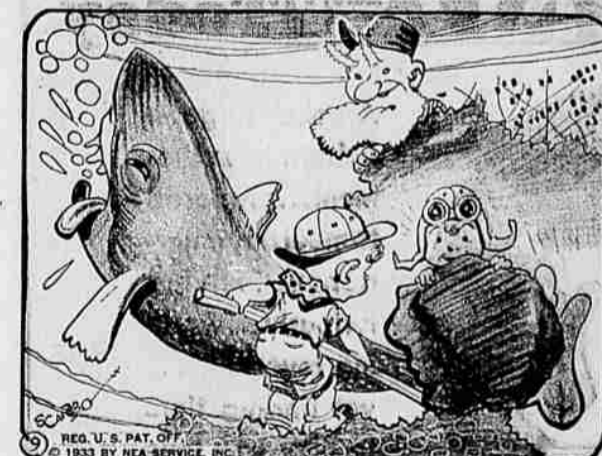
WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Secretary Wallace said today a nominal processing tax may be levied on hogs on or after October 1 to provide funds for financing the emergency hog reduction program now being worked out by his aides.

Under no consideration, he said, will a processing tax on swine be levied before the beginning of the hog marketing year which he added is generally recognized as being October 1.

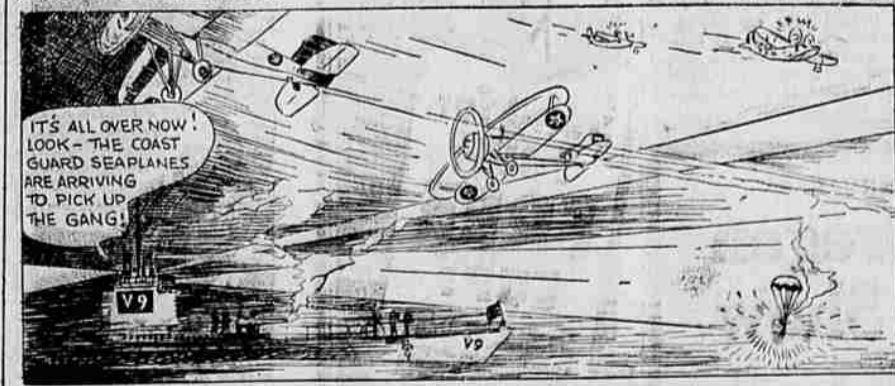

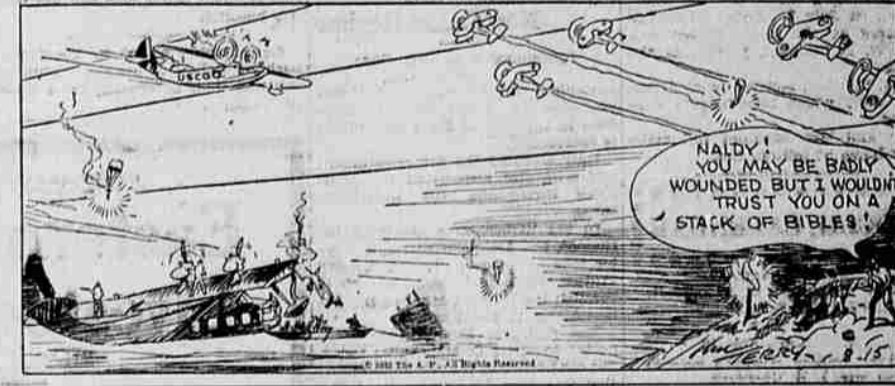
