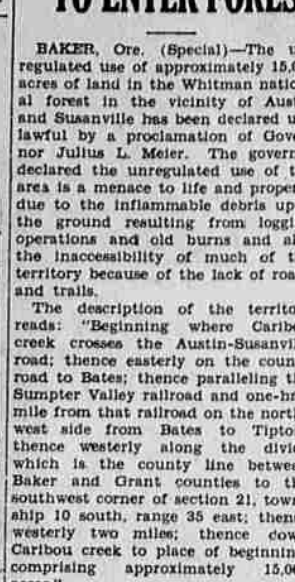

ECONOMIC WOES BANISHED FROM PORTUGUESE VILLAGE

LISBON (AP)—A village in which every man owns his house and land and into which problems of capital and labor never come is hidden in the thickly wooded district between the provinces of Alentejo and Beira Baixa.

In the communal spinning factory yarns are made from the wool of mountain sheep. Every cottage has its hand-loom, where cloth is woven into shawls, handkerchiefs and carpets. About 150,000 pounds of wool are turned into the finished product. Wheat and corn are ground in the communal windmill; they produce enough fruit and vegetables for their own needs, and the olive harvest is sent in communal oil-carts to the nearest factory to be turned into olive-oil.
