"OPEN SHOP" PROVISION MODIFIED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP) — An agreement between the automobile industry and the NRA upon the "open shop" provision of the industry's code was reached today, with spokesmen for the manufacturers accepting a modification proposed by Robert W. Lea, deputy administrator.

The change, which officials indicated represented the views of Hugh S. Johnson, the administrator, was the first modification of the "collective bargaining" labor clause of the industrial act which has been written in co-operation with the NRA.

The law, as written, provided for the organization and collective bargaining of employees with no restraint upon the type of representation they might select.

The additional modifying provision which was written in today after a conference between Lea and Representatives of the industry follows:

"Under the foregoing provisions, the employers in the industry may continue the open shop policy under which the selection, retention and advancement of employees will be on the basis of individual merit without regard to their affiliation or non-affiliation with any labor or other organization."

The belief was expressed by an official of the administration that the wording of the automobile code might be substituted in other major non-union industries to point the way to a settlement of the controversies over union organization.

In Portland Tuesday also attempting to interview the board, but most of them were unsuccessful, and those who did get a word found that no action could be expected for a few days.

To Use Telephones The local plan is to keep in touch with the Oregon board through long distance telephone until an appointment can be obtained, then a delegation will go to Portland with the brief and definite action may be hoped for. The Beaver Creek plan, also the E. O. N. training school project, may be expected to receive early approval, as it conforms with the desire of the public works administration as to character and also because it would put men to work immediately. Both of these projects also have been formally approved by election, another necessary step.

City Manager Angus McAllister today said that as soon as the brief was given definite approval by the federal authorities, work could be started immediately, with excavation to be the first step pending arrival of pipe, for which delivery would require approximately 30 days. Work on the reconstruction of the pipeline probably will be done in sections and

if early approval is forthcoming, some replacement might be completed before winter sets in.

Complete details relative to the Beaver Creek brief are to be announced in the near future, the city manager said.

La Grande's projects will be among the first to receive attention in spite of delays, as projects filed long ago and sent to Washington have been returned, it is said, for approval by the new Oregon board.

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
