

WALSH TURNS IN NO-HIT GAME FOR OAKLAND FRIDAY

Youthful Eddie Walsh has again proved his right to the name of his father, the great Ed Walsh, of Chicago White Sox fame.

Appearing in the second half of a twin bill with San Francisco, the Oaklander last night turned in one of the rarest of diamond performances, a no hit, no run game. The nightcap was for only seven innings, but such was Walsh's control as he beat the Beas 5-0 that he might well have blanked them for many more innings. Only 22 men faced him, Jimmy Zinn reaching first base when hit by a pitched ball.

In the opener Lou McEvoy bested Curt Davis of San Francisco in a pitching duel, 4-3.

Not content with a mound staff that is ranked as the best in the Coast league, Los Angeles last night used outfielder Marvin Gudat in the box against Sacramento and won, 13-4, to maintain its half-game lead over Hollywood.

Hollywood sent 10 runs home in the fourth inning to overcome an 8-0 Portland lead and emerge with a 14-10 victory. Badly battered by the Portlanders in the opening innings, Frank Shellenback went the route for Hollywood. Led by Vince De Maggio with a four-bagger and three singles, the Stars battered four Beaver tossers for 18 hits.

With Chick Ellsworth showing the way with three doubles, Seattle made it two straight over the Mission, 7-3.

500-MILE SPEEDWAY RACE TO KEEP LIMIT ON FUEL

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Despite opposition that arose at the last 500-mile automobile race at the Speedway here, there probably will be no change in the rule permitting only a 15-gallon fuel tank on racing cars, officials have indicated.

The rule was adopted with the design of forcing economy in fuel consumption, as was another rule limiting the amount of oil to six gallons. The most important change likely to be adopted is a rule limiting the number of starters to 33, and creation of a committee to pass upon the qualifications of the drivers. Forty-two cars started last May, and officials believe the excess traffic was responsible for the large number of fatalities.

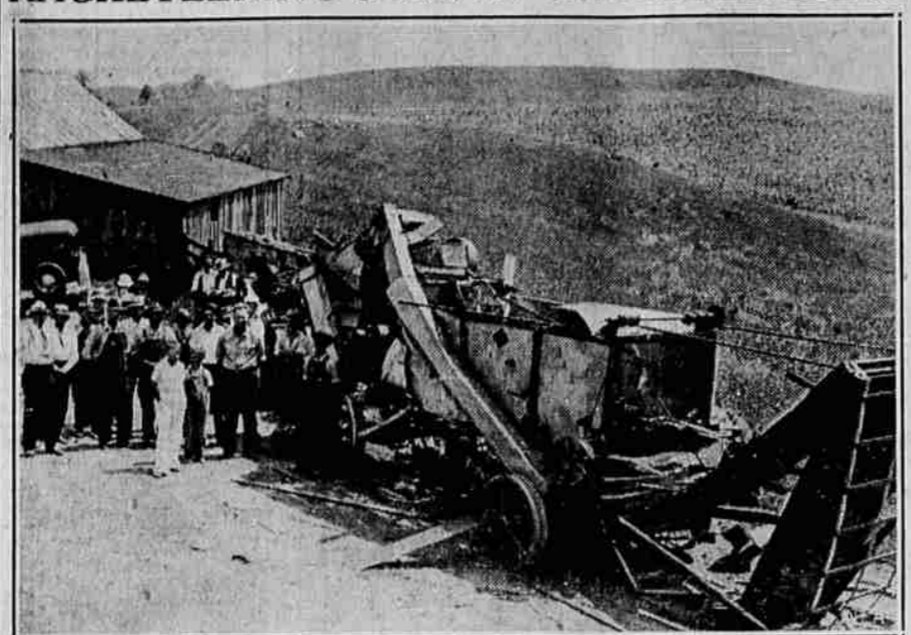
Brings Bank Aid To NRA Drive

HURLER ON COAST BARRED FROM BIG LEAGUES—TOO BAD

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Weary, foot-sore major league scouts, tramping the Pacific slopes these summer days and nights in quest of pitching talent, cast a mournful eye upon one Frank Shellenback.

The tall Hollywood right-hander had won fourteen games when seven thirds of the season were over. Seven defeats were written against him in the Coast league standings.

Lame "Em Out of Lot

In the four previous seasons he won 99 games, against 36 defeats, but that isn't the full story of his ability. He's a pinch hitter of the first water. Six times this year he has hit for the circuit.

Since 1929 he has made 39 round trips by hammering the ball out of the lot and his batting average for the last quarter of years is .293. This despite the fact that "Shelly" now is 34.

But Shellenback can't be had by the majors. The most consistent hurler in the league over a prolonged period of time, he can't go up. Neither can he go down to a loop of lower classification.

He's Shipwrecked, Mate!

In fact, he is stranded on the shores of the Pacific like a shipwrecked seafarer. He is marooned in the Coast league because of too much moisture.

STOCK EXCHANGE SUFFERING FROM ENNUI THIS WEEK

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP) — A sudden decline on Wednesday — coincident with a break in grains — and a sharp recovery the following day, when cereals spurted, enlivened an otherwise dull week on the stock exchange.

Except for these signs of life, the market suffered from acute ennui. Stocks were influenced by events in the Chicago board of trade, although they evoked an attentive ear to fresh rumors about inflation. The market was thin all week.

The stock exchange was closed today in line with the summer schedule.

The grain market celebrated the termination of a minimum "pegged" price on Wednesday by a prompt drop to the full limit permitted for a single day's fluctuations. Stocks came tumbling after, but the picture was reversed the next day.

The dollar got the worst of it in the foreign exchange markets, where traders jump at the shadow of an inflation rumor. Apparently the chief basis for the new money stories was the White House visit of certain members who also happen to be confirmed inflationists.

Wide attention centered on a report of Secretary of Labor Perkins indicating that employment has risen to the level of October, 1931, with July payrolls \$29,000,000 above the weekly wage in March.

While food prices advanced 8 1-3 per cent last month, said Miss Perkins, payrolls gained 7.9 per cent in the same period.
