and cotton linters are exempt from tax, providing one can show that the product is made from cotton linters.

But back to the decimals. Here's the dope. To figure the tax all you have to do is determine, first how much percentage cotton there is in something, and find out how much the percentage will weigh, and then multiply it by 4.4184, which is the cents per pound tax. And if the decimal point doesn't get in the right place—well, that's certainly too bad!

Now for the list (this isn't the entire list—it's too long to publish except by installments):

Twine, absorbent cotton, adhesive plaster, armature winding, artificial flowers, handbags, sporting goods such as balls, baseball gloves, etc., bathtubs, beds, bibs, brake linings, bride veils, brief cases, brushes, cases, casings (sausages), porch chairs, all kinds of cloths, horse collars, all kinds of covers from animal to winders and slashers, baby cribs, dolls, dollies, draperies, favors, fishing tackle, tire flaps, gears, orthopedic needles, needles (for either legs or lawn), insoles, powder puffs, typewriter ribbons, mattresses, needle holders, oil-cloth, pads, puppers, roofing rugs, shavers, towels, weather stripping, truck wheels, wearing apparel, accessories, etc.

This cotton tax will have 'em all worried—drug stores, garages, retail merchants of all sorts including grocers, hardware stores, etc.

There's going to be a lot of figuring in this man's town before many more days have passed!

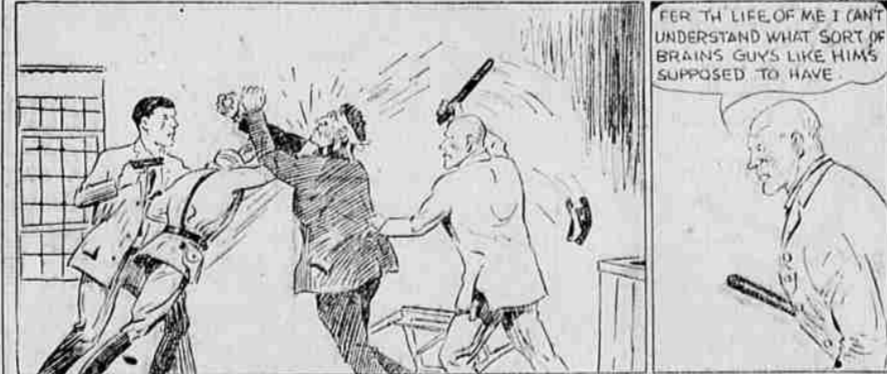

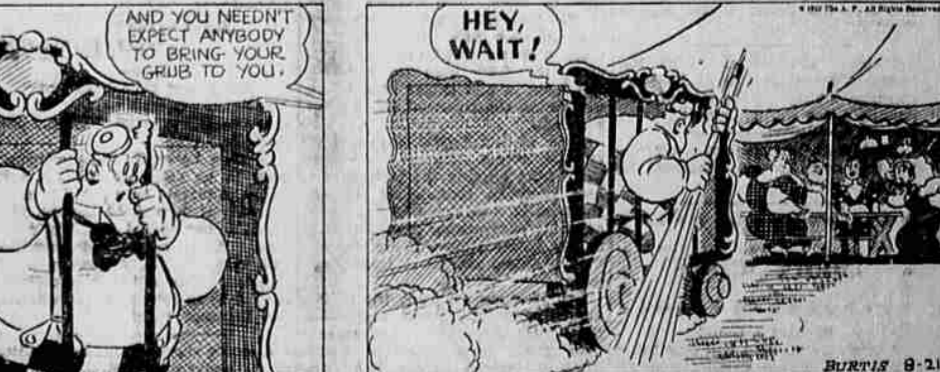
