Grounds Ready

The grounds have been put into good shape by a crew of men headed by D. E. Richards. Weeds have been mowed and raked off, the grounds leveled and sprinkled and the grandstand repaired. A valuable addition to the arena equipment is a set of six new modern chutes where horses will be saddled and mounted instead of in the arena as heretofore. They are substantially built and the whole side swings open, thus eliminating danger of injury to either rider or horse. The stalls have been bedded down with new straw and new hay will be delivered at the grounds for the exhibitors at small cost.

Cecil Griggs, who has charge of the F. F. A. work, says there will be a stock judging contest among the boys from the seven chapters that will be represented at the show. Tom Willet, of Wallawa, state president of the F. F. A., will be here with a truck load of good Jersey stock. Advance notice indicates that the 4-H clubs also will be well represented.

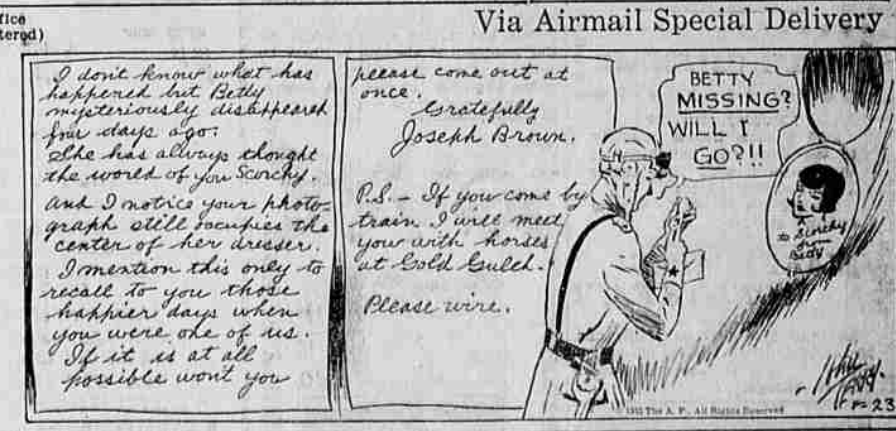
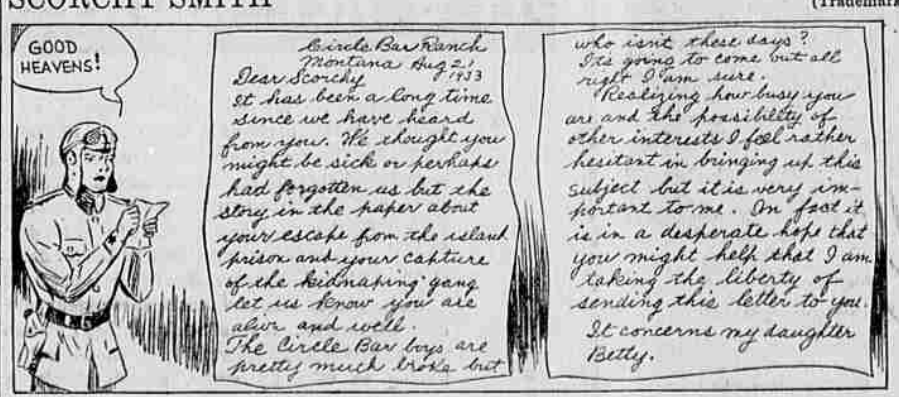
