GROSS RETURN OF \$6000 ON 16 ACRES SPUDS

Potato farmers are coming into their own this season, according to the Nampa (Idaho) Free Press, which reports profits gained from recent sales in this district.

One farmer in the Nampa territory, who realized upon the newspaper to withhold his name from publication, said he realized a gross return of \$6,000 from 16 acres of Early Cobbler. "This is the biggest profit I have ever realized on spuds," he declared.

The crop yielded more than 200 sacks to the acre, and brought from \$1.75 to \$2.35 aboard car. He was fortunate to sell at the peak of the market, although potatoes are still holding good.
