

### PORTLAND DROPS GAME TO FRISCO TO EVEN SERIES

Given a helping hand by three second division clubs, Los Angeles routed a little more comfortably today as it paced the Coast league by a game and a half margin.

The Angels helped themselves a bit, too, yesterday, outlasting Seattle, 8-7, in a 10-inning tussle while second division clubs were thumping Hollywood, Portland and Sacramento.

Oakland jarred Hollywood's pennant hopes with a 15-5 trouncing. Lee Stine produced 6-hit pitching at Portland to give San Francisco an 8-3 win and even the series. In addition, the Seal hurler battled in three runs with a double and single. Annie Galan's two grounds and single led the 10-inning assault on Turpin, Jacobs and Wilson. Three wild pitches by Wilson and two Portland boots helped the Seals to five unearned runs.

First Sacker, Babe Dahlgren, of the Missions, went wild with his bat at San Francisco as the Reds outslugged Sacramento, 11-10.

### MUCH INTEREST BEING SHOWN IN LABOR DAY CARD

A boxing card that will rank with the best ever staged in this city has been announced for Labor day evening, at the Sacajawea Annex arena at 8 o'clock, featuring Frankie Monroe, of Klamath Falls, and Battling Johnnie O'Hara, of Los Angeles, in the ten round main event.

This card, which has been approved by the city boxing commission, includes several other bouts, but most of the attention is centering on the Monroe-O'Hara fight. Both men have fought headliners in most of the large cities of the west, and both are going strong at present. Indications are that La Grande will have a top-notch attraction for the fans of fist-hum, and a large crowd is expected.

The semi-final will be an eight-rounder between Jimmy Museler and Johnny Stewart, local boys weighing in at 145 pounds. It is advertised as a grudge fight, and both scrappers appear to be taking it seriously, having being working out all of this month in preparation.

The special six-round event will find Jerry Evans, 130, of La Grande, attempting to handle the hard-hitting, fast-moving Cret Hardwick, of Baker, who also tips the scales at 130 pounds.

Two four-round preliminary fights will be arranged.

An arena is being built in the Sacajawea Annex and it is planned to continue boxing cards throughout the winter, particularly if the Labor day crowd indicates reawakening of interest in this district in boxing cards.

### OREGON PRESS DIVIDED AS TO PROPOSAL FOR A SALES TAX

The Associated Press Conducts Survey Among State Newspapers to Discover Their Opinions as to Proposed Plan to Aid The Unemployed.

A division of opinion as to the propriety of a special sales tax to insure a fund through which Oregon could match federal money to provide relief for an estimated 120,000 unemployed persons this fall and winter, was evident among daily newspapers of the state today.

At a meeting in Portland Tuesday in which Governor Julius L. Meier called in legislative leaders, tax authorities, heads of relief organizations and chairmen of civic organizations, the special sales tax appeared to be the only plan through which the money, admittedly necessary, could be raised.

The Associated Press Wednesday undertook a survey of Oregon's daily newspapers to learn the viewpoint of the press at this preliminary stage of the discussion.

The Morning Oregonian endorsed the proposal for a special sales tax which would be devoted wholly to unemployment relief.

The Capital Journal at Salem announced it would support the plan, and the Oregon Statesman of that city was to state editorially Thursday that it will not oppose the special sales tax, although it believes the suggestion will be futile.

On the other hand, the Daily News-Journal at Medford, the Klamath Falls Evening Herald and the Morning News there announced both "probably would be generally favorable to a sales tax for unemployment relief, but would recommend that all other plans be studied and presented to the public before any single plan is seriously advanced, inasmuch as the sales tax idea was once defeated."

The Medford Mail Tribune favors calling a special session of the legislature to provide funds for unemployment relief and for the regulation of liquor, in anticipation of repeal of the 18th amendment. It believes, also, that "opponents of the sales tax should present their alternative to the sales tax in detail before the session is called, or admit they have no plan."

At Roseburg, the News Review feels that in view of the overwhelming disapproval of the general sales tax at the last election, "such a measure should be a last resort in raising funds to relieve unemployment."

The paper said it would approve the sales tax "only if and when it is found that no other plan can be successfully carried out."

The Courier at Grants Pass opposed what is described as a "political bulldozer" for a special legislative session and a state sales tax, and called on the Josephine county delegation to institute and support a "county first" drive.
