

FREITAS BLANKS ANGELS; STARS CLIMB TO FIRST

The thumb of Hay Jacobs, Coast league home run king, splintered last Sunday has sent Hollywood into first place in the pennant race. At least the damaged thumb has had a lot to do with the Stars' passing the first-moving Los Angeles Angels.

With the injured Jacobs on the bench, a young man christened Daniel Patrick Michael Crowley took over the Hollywood first base duties. Tuesday he clouted a ninth inning homer to give the Stars a 3-2 win over Sacramento. Last night he knocked two balls over the Wrigley field fence to account for three runs as the Stars made it two straight over the Solons, 6-4. The Stars now top Los Angeles by half a game.

Freitas Blanks Angels
Tony Freitas last night flashed the form that made him one of the Philadelphia Athletics' most effective pitchers last year as he shut out Los Angeles, 1-0. The Portland hurler gave the Angels only four scattered blows as he bested Dick Ward, the circuit's leading tower, in a fine mound duel. Both pitchers were backed up by fast fielding and sensational catches. Freitas struck out 11 men and Ward 10.

In the only other Coast league game Johnny Babich pitched the Missions to a 7-2 victory over Oakland. San Francisco and Seattle were rained out.

"Castoffs" Keep Beavers In The Pennant Chase

PORTLAND, Ore., (AP) — Using a bunch of "castoffs" from other Coast league clubs, Portland is making a determined bid for its second straight championship as the last weeks of play were entered.

The Beavers, under Spencer Abbott, are a veteran crew with the skipper apparently uninterested in developing young players for the majors. Of the regular squad only Pitchers Jacobs, Wilson and Bowman and infielder Kceves have not played in the uniform of other coast nines.

The interesting phase of Portland's play has been its consistent winning and crowding for top place in the standing. Two catches and five pitchers released by other clubs of the circuit have played in rare form for the Beavers.

The best showing of the "castoff" bunch was made in July when all of the opposition was swept away and Portland crowded Sacramento out of the league lead.

Earl Sheely has been with three other coast teams while most of the regulars have been with at least two other clubs. Johnny Monroe, second catcher, was with the Missions of San Francisco and Sacramento before joining Portland.

Babe Ruth Finds Himself Through; Legs Failing Him

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (AP) — The habit of writing flin to Babe Ruth's baseball career, a popular winter pastime for years, now has extended to the home run king himself.

"I guess I might as well hang up my spikes," he said mournfully last night. "I can't sign up as a player next year. The legs won't stand it. I might get by at first base, but not in the outfield. I'm through."

While the boys have been guessing him into the management of either the White Sox or the Red Sox next season, Ruth knows nothing about it.

"That's up to several other people besides myself," he said. "I'm still the property of the Yankees. If another club wanted me for manager, they would have to make sort of a deal with Col. Ruppert. It's up to the owners of the other clubs. I haven't been approached, even unofficially, by anyone."

The Babe then had another idea. "Maybe I'll just voluntarily retire for a year. I could stand a long vacation and then see how things work out in 1935."
