DETROIT, Sept. 2 (AP)—Henry Ford, nearing the end of his vacation in the Michigan north woods, today continued to keep the nation guessing as to his attitude toward efforts to bring his huge automobile factories under the aegis of the Blue Eagle.

Shut away from the world in the Huron mountain club on the shores of Lake Superior, the 70-year-old industrialist has thus far refused to discuss the approved code for the automotive industry. Today he was expected to board the ore carrier, Henry Ford, which would bring him back to Detroit Monday.

No announcement as to the action of the Ford Motor company is expected before that time.

HOPE HELD FORTH IN DISEASE FIGHT

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 2 (AP)—Discovery by a woman pathologist of the presence of a filterable virus in the bodies of "sleeping sickness" victims was acclaimed today as the first important finding in science's effort to seek a cause or cure for the puzzling disease which has taken 55 lives here in the last five weeks.

The woman is Dr. Margaret G. Smith, assistant professor of pathology at the Washington university school of medicine, and a graduate of Johns Hopkins university.

Determination that the disease is caused by such a virus does not isolate the cause of encephalitis, but it narrows the search materially.

TELESCOPE, NAPOLEON'S GIFT

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—A six-inch telescope given Father Edward Sorin, C. S. B., first president of Notre Dame university, by Napoleon III and the Empress Eugenie still is used in the university observatory.

Kiddle, president of the senate and elected permanent chairman of the committee of the whole, appointed two committees following a three-hour discussion of the problems and possible remedy of the unemployment situation. Kiddle named Raymond B. In addition to relief measures, the special session, when called, will be called upon to act upon other proposals, including the truck and bus law, regulation of liquor sales when the 18th amendment is repealed, and the matter of tax delinquency, which it was stated now totaled more than \$48,000,000.

Educational Meetings Held — 9 — August 10th to 19th, inclusive. Total attendance—537, most of them actual farm operators.

Organization Meetings — At which all permanent committees were elected, held—9, August 19th to August 30th. Total attendance, 411.

The community organizations are now complete, nine community divisions having elected nine county directors and 18 committeemen. Sign-up of members at the organization meetings figured in actual bushels represented about 90 per cent at North Powder, 95 per cent at Cove, 90 per cent at Alice and 80 per cent at Summerville according to committeemen elected. Other communities also report a good sign-up.

Committees are now engaged in assisting farmers to complete their applications having established definite headquarters and hours for such assistance at Elgin, Imbler, Alice, North Powder and Union. The county agricultural agent is assisting these

committees and has held four committee meetings for this purpose. Permanent committees elected are as follows:

this morning, according to R. Z. Baxter, committee chairman in this city, and the deadline for the drive definitely was set for 8:30 o'clock tonight.

Ten districts had been completed Friday morning and this morning the total was up to 18, and in several of the others the work was well under way with promise of completion this morning or by early afternoon.

The eight districts reporting their work completed Friday follow: No. 4, in charge of American Legion auxiliary; 8, Conductors; 9, Rebekahs; 13, Grocery association; 21, Methodist Episcopal church; 22, Engineers; 28, L. D. S. Second Ward; 30, Catholic church.

Mr. Baxter today urged that all committees make a special effort to conclude their work by 8:30 o'clock tonight—sooner if possible. He will receive reports up to that time.

He also urges that all committees, even if their work is not completed by that time, report in so that "pinch-hitting" details can be sent out to clean up the campaign at the last minute.

Those who at first refused to sign the Blue Eagle consumers' pledge in every case have pledged co-operation after an explanation of the purpose of the signing, he reported. An enthusiastic response is being reported by all committees which have completed their districts or have made partial reports.

At the post office, the signing of Blue Eagle membership pledges — the president's re-employment agreements — continued unabated. New signers since yesterday noon included: Western Union, J. A. Garity & Son, Curry Press and I. W. Nelson Second Hand store. This brought the total business and professional men operating under the Blue Eagle here to 251.

COAL PROBLEM NOT SETTLED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—A new rift in soft coal negotiations today joined reticent Henry Ford as twin disturbers of NRA's first weekend rest.

Conferences in labor contracts between Appalachian bituminous coal operators and the United Mine Workers of America were at so complete a standstill that the advice of Hugh S. Johnson again was sought by the disputants.

Both problems were paralleled by two events hailed as recovery achievements:

The \$12,000,000,000 oil industry's code today became effective.

The American Federation of Labor attributed to the recovery program a \$5,000,000,000 increase in purchasing power—an amount sufficient to raise retail sales 17 per cent.

Today provided NRA's first taste of its own fewer-works-hours doctrine. Johnson, who says his staff has worked on a "30-hour day," ordered all offices closed at 1 o'clock, not to reopen until Tuesday morning. But everybody expected some exceptions to the rule, particularly in view of the new coal troubles.

Pierce Requests All Support Blue Eagle

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"We have enacted during the past session of congress the most audacious law ever passed in the history of legislation. It is the recovery act. It must succeed, and I urge you all to subscribe to the NRA code. I do not know how long it is going to work, but if it fails as President Roosevelt recently said, he will be the last president of the United States. If it succeeds, he will be the greatest president in our history.

"Let us not be afraid of this law. It is an experiment, and it may be leading toward a national socialism that will save enough of capitalism that property rights will be secure."
